Staying **Active** During The **Coronavirus Pandemic**

Indoor Activities

- Put some music on and walk briskly around the house or up and down the stairs for 10- 15 minutes, 2 -3 times per day.
- Dance to your favorite music.
- Jump rope (if your joints can handle it).
- Do an exercise video.
- Use home cardio machines if you have them.

Outdoor Activities

- Walk or jog around your neighborhood. Stay 6 feet away from others.
- Be active in a local park. Spending time in nature may enhance immune function. Wash your hands when you get home.
- Go for a bicycle ride.
- Do gardening and lawn work (Spring is around the corner!).
- Play active games with your family.

Strength Training

- Download a strength workout app to your smart phone, such as the 7-Minute Workout (no equipment necessary).
- Do a strength training video.
- Perform yoga deep breathing and mindfulness can also reduce anxiety.
- Find ways to do simple muscle strengthening exercises around your house such as:
 - ° Squats or sit-to-stands from a sturdy chair
 - ° Push-ups against a wall, the kitchen counter or the floor
 - Lunges or single leg step-ups on stairsI'm under quarantine but not infected. ShouldI limit my physical activity?

Moderate-intensity physical activity can boost your immune system. However high-intensity high volume training may suppress immune function especially if you are unaccustomed to it. Balance your workout program. Don't sit all day! For example: If watching TV, get up during every commercial (or periodically) and do a lap around your home or an active chore. For example, throw some clothes in the laundry, do the dishes or take out the garbage. Feel productive after just one show!

Social Security Recipients Who Don't Usually File Tax Returns Will Automatically Get \$1,200 Payments, Treasury Says In Reversal

The Treasury announced late Wednesday that Social Security beneficiaries who typically do not file a tax return will automatically get the \$1,200 payment.

The announcement is a reversal from earlier in the week when the Internal Revenue Service said everyone would need to file some sort of tax return in order to qualify for the payments. Democrats and some Republicans criticized the IRS for requiring so many extra hurdles for this vulnerable population to get aid when the government already has their information on file.

The reversal came as the Trump administration tries to rapidly get stimulus payments out to Americans in the face of the quickest economic decline in modern history.

"Social Security recipients who are not typically required to file a tax return need to take no action, and will receive their payment directly to their bank account," said Treasury Secretary Steven T. Mnuchin.

The \$2.2 trillion aid legislation, passed in response to the coronavirus pandemic, directed the Treasury to look at Americans' 2019 or 2018 tax returns to determine if they are eligible for a payment. But the law also said Treasury should look at Social Security data for seniors and the disabled.

Criticism poured in after the IRS posted a notice on its website on Monday instructing Social Security recipients who do not normally send in a return to file a "simple" tax return, which would be available soon.

More than 15 million Americans on Social Security do not file an annual tax return because their income is so low, according to the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

Calculate how much you'll get from the \$1,200 (or more) coronavirus checks

Forty-one Democratic senators sent the White House a letter Wednesday asking why the Trump administration is placing this "significant burden" on senior citizens and the disabled. GOP Sen. Josh Hawley of Missouri called it "ridiculous."

Despite language Congress passed in #COVID—19 relief bill to ensure Social Security beneficiaries would NOT have to file taxes to receive direct relief, IRS issued guidance saying seniors DO have to file taxes. That's ridiculous. IRS should follow the law that Congress passed

During the last recession, when the U.S. government sent most Americans a stimulus check and required a filed tax return to get it, 3.5 million Social Security recipients were left out because they never sent a return, according to a 2008 Treasury Department analysis.

There were concerns that even more people won't file during the pandemic. But the Trump administration ultimately reversed course.

'Mnuchin said direct deposits should begin by April 17, followed by checks in the mail.

Look for the 2020 census. It should arrive soon if it hasn't already. It is vitally important that you get counted.





P.S. Can you find a pair of antonyms for EACH letter of the alphabet? Start with "A" – ail – well.



How Do You Get A New Medicare Card?







Without you we all know that this center would not be what it is, and we are so busy and we are unable to keep it staffed with paid people. We are so grateful for all your hours and dedication in making this building and this facility as special as it is.



Yea! St. Louis (And Maybe Metro)!

Did you know that the St. Louis City "shutdown" in response to the Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918 was the model for action then and now?


When the FLU reached epidemic proportions and was racing across the world – U.S. included – Dr. Max Starkloff, St. Louis Public Health Commissioner, SHUT DOWN St. Louis on Oct. 4, 1918. St. Louis was then the 4th largest city in the United States. He closed schools, churches, bars, pool halls, sporting events, movie theaters, and any large gatherings. Washington University cancelled a football game and suspended classes. Businessmen were angry. Mayor Henry Kiel supported Dr. Starkloff.

In 1918, not everyone had electricity or indoor plumbing. Many people relied on well-water. River boats plied the Mississippi & Missouri rivers. Horse drawn vehicles were on the streets (and their "leavings" and a few cars). Vaccines and Pasturized milk were in their early years. Sulfa And antibiotics were DREAMS for the future. No disposable masks; wash and wear, wash and wear, wash & etc.

The shut- down was lifted December 28, 1918. When the Flu results were tallied in the U.S., St. Louis had the lowest death rate of the then 10 largest U.S. cities. The standard of care was set. Hunker down for a spell. Each of us can make a contribution to health and recoery.*

As a hospice volunteer you will be oriented to the hospice program by one of our Volunteer Coordinators. This will enable you to have the skills needed to assist patients and their families.


