
Donation To Old Millstadt

Easter Baskets





Meals on Wheels Hero

On Tuesday, March 9, 2021, Millstadt Senior Center Director Patty Evansco received a call from a Meals on Wheels client who wanted to express her gratitude. The day before a Meals on Wheels volunteer delivered her meal. She answered the door, visited with the volunteer, and on he went to the next stop. Seconds later, the volunteer returned to her door explaining that he had detected the odor of gas while leaving her home. The volunteer advised the client to notify the gas company. She called her son who lives nearby. Upon his arrival, he called Ameren. Ameren directed them to leave the house immediately. Within twenty minutes, Ameren arrived and found several basement pipes leaking gas. Ameren disconnected the gas and instructed them to call a certified plumber to repair the pipes. Refusing to go home with one of her sons, the client stayed in her home that night. Luckily, the temperature in her home never got below 67 degrees. The plumber came first thing in the morning to make the repairs. Ameren was contacted; they arrived within the hour, inspected the job, and reconnected the gas.

This is an example of the importance of Meals on Wheels. The volunteer did not want any recognition. The client did not want her name to be revealed. Meals on Wheels volunteers go beyond just delivering meals. This situation had a happy ending thanks to our thoughtful volunteer.

Renewal of Homestead Exemption

If you have received a Homestead Exemption last year that usually needs to be annually filed, due to COVID-19 safety provisions, please be aware that for

the 2021 assessment year, your exemption will be approved for any property that was approved for the 2020 assessment year, without application, provided that:


- 1. The owner of record for the property Jan 1, 2021 is the same owner of record of the property that was approved for this exemption for the 2020 assessment year.
- 10 mesterion 2. The taxpayer for the 2020 assessment year as not asked for the exemption to be removed for the 2020 or 2021 assessment years.
- 3. The taxpayer or heirs will be required to inform the Assessor's office of a change of status that was required for approval of 2020 assessment year. Examples of this would be service-connected disability rating change, taxpayer who had the senior status is not living on the property or is now deceased, Social Security Administration no longer is providing disability benefits. Seniors has gone above the financial threshold of household income of **\$65.000**.

In summary, you will NOT be required to fill out a renewal application to receive the homestead exemption for the 2021 assessment year. If you have any questions, you may call the Assessor's office at 618-825-2704

The Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze is an exemption available to senior citizens can apply for a freeze of the assessed value of property. Applicant must be 65 or older and have a total household income of \$65,000 or less and must be the owner of record and use the property as their principal residence. Contact the Assessor's Office at (618) 825-2704 for more information and/or an application.

Senior Citizens Real **Estate** Tax Deferral Program allows persons 65 years of age and older, who have a total household income of less than \$55,000 and meet certain other qualifications, to defer all or part of the real estate taxes and special assessments on their principal residences. The deferral is similar to a loan against the property's market value. A lien is filed on the property in order to ensure repayment of the deferral. The state pays the property taxes and then recovers the money, plus 6 percent annual interest, when the property is sold or transferred. The deferral must be repaid within one year of the taxpayer's death or 90 days after the property ceases to qualify for this program. The maximum amount that can be deferred, including interest and lien fees, is 80 percent of the taxpayer's equity interest in the property. The maximum annual amount is \$5,000.00. To apply for real estate tax deferrals, Forms PTAX-1017-TD, Application for Deferral of Real Estate Taxes, and PTAX-1018-TD, Real Estate Tax Deferral and Recovery Agreement, must be completed. Contact St. Clair County Treasurers Office, (618) 825-2451, to receive the necessary forms.



Tax Multipliers This Spring

Last fall our organization published the probable tax multipliers for area townships. The final numbers were published in very small type in the News-Democrat. There has not been any news article in St. Clair County's newspapers explaining what is going on. So here is the scoop. If local governments keep the same tax rates then tax bills will increase the following percentages:

The townships of Lenzburg, Fayetteville, Marissa and New Athens will see a decrease of 3%.

The Board of Review assigns township multipliers so the county-wide multiplier will be 1.00 instead of 1.0233.

Our taxpayer's organization monitors these numbers and publishes tax articles in the quarterlies every three months.

ALSO, there are two bills in the legislature that could impact the Senior Homestead Tax Freeze. One bill will raise the income limit to \$75,000 and the other bill will increase the income limit to \$85,000. A summary of many bills appears in the March Newsletter of the Citizens Federation of St. Clair County.



"HE LIVES"

Hello and welcome to our monthly Bible Study. I hope you are well and enjoying your day. Our study today centers around St. Peter and the beginning of his mission. To go forward, however, we must go back to St. Luke's first book and read Luke 22:54-62. The BEFORE Peter. We conclude this study with an example. A basic understanding that all we have comes from our most gracious and giving God and we are to share. This message from the very beginning of the Christian Church. (Acts 4:32-36)

Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it Holy. (Exodus 4:32-36) what did Peter and the other early Christians do on the Sabbath? The same as Jesus: "and on the Sabbath Day He went into the Synagogue, as was His custom". (Luke 4:16). Easter comes early this year. Capture the moment. Your day of rest. Your place of peace. Your local church!







A Day Trip For The Bored

If you need some time away from the same-old-same-old routine it may be time to pack a lunch and head for the open road. About 80 miles north east of here is the oldest surviving capital building in Illinois. Vandalia is also where Abraham Lincoln took his very first political office.



Outside the Vandalia Statehouse is the Madonna of the Trail Statue. One of only twelve in the country, it depicts a pioneer woman with two children. The statue serves as a memorial for pioneers who lead the way west in covered wagons.

One must see item on the Vandalia trip is the Kaskaskia Dragon. Yes, it does breathe fire, even if it's fueled by propane. The 35 foot structure was built for a Halloween parade but found a more permanent location off Veterans Avenue. \$1 tokens can be purchased at Kaskaskia Supply across the street to get your own 10 second fire-breathing show from the metal dragon.

Vandalia Lake is located 4 miles northwest of the city and provides a place for fishing, boating and picnicking. The 660 acre lake is stocked with largemouth bass, catfish and bluegill.

If you are not ready for a big "on the road" trip try some near home and be safe.



Nature's Own Sweetener

Here is the answer to a frequently asked trivia question, when we had table to table and face to face trivia events. What is a food item that never spoils? The answer, honey. Yes, it's something you could



have purchased when the Covid epidemic began and it would be good a thousand years from now. Let's hope this epidemic is over by then.

What are some other benefits of honey besides a natural sweetener that will never spoil?

Honey is available from local suppliers at the Millstadt Farmers' Market. Apiculture is the collection of honey from wild or domesticated bee colonies. Local honey is often collected from bees who have collected nectar from clover, locust trees blooms, apple and cherry blossoms, dandelion and other flowers.

Honey is one of those heart healthy foods. Honey can reduce the risk of heart disease. It can lower triglycerides levels, lower cholesterol and blood sugar. Keep in mind that honey is high in natural sugar and calories. Not good for those of you at risk of high blood sugar. Moderation is the key here.

Medical grade honey, like Medihoney, can be treat burns and wounds with its natural hydrogen peroxide. It has also ben known to help skin conditions like eczema and psoriasis.

For sore throat relief, honey's antibacterial and anti-



inflammatory properties can soothe sore throats and coughs.

Two caution notes, because honey contains trace amounts of pollen, it may include a minor allergic reaction to those with allergies. Also, do not give honey to children under 12 months. Honey does contain bacteria that can cause infant botulism.

Trivia question: What is the meaning of apiculture? If you don't remember go back to the beginning of this article.

Honey is also shown in some studies to improve memory function. Remember, in May the Farmer's Market will be open and offer some buying opportunities for honey and other locally grown produce.

REFUSE: Mayor Todd stated Waste Management will be providing residents with rolling trash cans, as discussed at a previous meeting. If anyone would like to opt out, there will be a number to call.

STREETS, ALLEYS, AND SIDEWALKS: Scott Baltz stated he picked up the books for the Laurel Street Curb and Gutter project. The contracts need to be signed. Randy Burk stated Brad Schaller submitted the EPA paperwork for Hunter's Point Subdivision. The Mayor and Clerk needs to sign it.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS, MAINTENANCE, AND EQUIPMENT: Scott Baltz stated the leaf vac is sold and they are just waiting for it to be picked up.

ANNEXATIONS: Mayor Todd stated he is still waiting on signatures on the paperwork for the Cotter property. They will sign it when they come back to town.

PARKS, POOL AND RECREATION: Mark Todd stated they have begun working on the Biathlon. They are tentatively planning on holding it in September; Lynn Muskopf is working on dates. Mayor Todd stated the Village receives grant money for hosting the Biathlon so it would be great to have the race again this year.

CEMETERY: Ray Famula stated he is still working on getting bids for a new sign.

COMMUNITY CENTER: Ray Famula stated the February Board meeting had been canceled due to weather. The Senior Center gave assistance for signing up for the Covid vaccine to 322 people in January and 300 people so far in February. Director Patty Evansco is still working on a plan to reopen the Senior Center. The next Senior Center Board meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 16th at 6pm.

PLANNING COMMISSION & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: Mike French stated the next Planning Commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 16th.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Police Department – Crissy Pipik swore in Alan Hucke as the Millstadt Police Chief. Mayor Todd presented former Police Chief Ed Wilkerson with a plaque for his 30 years of service to the community. When Ed started with the Millstadt Police Department there were only three officers in the department. Thanks to Ed the department has grown and they now provide the Youth Academy, D.A.R.E., and the Explorers. He allowed the officers opportunities to participate in the Auto Task Force and the Drug Task Force, among others. On behalf of the community, Mayor Todd thanked Ed for his service. Ed stated he had a great career; he

wouldn't change a thing and thanked the community.

BUILDING COMMISSIONER: Adam Romero stated the trustees received copies of the new building applications. He tried to make them easier to fill out and less confusing. The new applications should be easier for both the residents and the office staff.

OLD BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated bids for asphalting on East Madison Street and South Breese Street are due by 5pm on Monday, March 22nd.

Mayor Todd stated he gave the Trustees information about the gaming ordinance. He would like them to look at the language and make sure they are ok with it while they are moving forward.

Mayor Todd stated the Village had a contract with a company to service the elevator at the Community Center. The Village hired a new company as the old contract had expired. However, the old company keeps sending bills. He and the office staff are attempting to come to an agreeable solution. If necessary, he will involve Village Attorney Brian Flynn.

Mike Capell stated the office staff and the Police Department had training on the new Village website. It seemed to go well and there was a lot to observe. He is going to get with the project manager from CivicPlus to make sure the live date is still Friday, March 5th. The new website will be a nice update to what we currently have.

NEW BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated he worked with State Representatives Greenwood and Belt to award the Village a \$100,000 grant for infrastructure for the community. It will probably be used for sewer work in the Coachlite subdivision. Mayor Todd thanked the Representatives for the award.

Mayor Todd stated he and Tracy Holmes have been talking to Cadagin Prosser Financial. The Village has a CD for \$100,000 that is up and the rates aren't good. The money has to stay in something low risk though so they will probably just extend the CD for five years.

Randy Burk stated he has been working on the Community Block Grant for the 700 block of West Laurel Street. He will have a Resolution at the next meeting for the Trustees to vote on.

Mayor Todd stated he received a virtual public meeting notice from the Intergovernmental Grants Department for 10am on Tuesday, March 2nd. If any Trustee is able to attend please do so. It can help the Village more with the block grant.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Tracy Holmes stated that the Treasurer's Report had been submitted. Ray Famula made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

CLERK'S REPORT: Tracy Holmes stated that the Clerk's Report had been submitted. Ray Famula made a motion to approve the Clerk's Report. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

ADJOURNMENT: Mike Capell made a motion to adjourn the general Village Board meeting and was seconded by Mark Todd. The motion carried unanimously.
