### IMPORTANT VOTING INFORMATION

### November 3, 2020 Election

Avoid the lines!!! Vote by Mail. VOTING BY MAIL IS STRONGLY ENCOURAGED BY THE STATE OF ILLINOIS FOR COUNTY RESIDENTS CONCERNED ABOUT CORONAVIRUS.

A new law now allows voters to avoid polling places, and the possibility of catching COVID-19.

All registered voters in St. Clair County will automatically receive a vote-by-mail application



through the postal service. Applications are being mailed out, I received mine today, July 29, 2020. Voters must sign and date the application. If you wish your ballot mailed to an address other than what is on the application, there is space available on the application to indicate.

If your application is approved, you will receive your ballot by mail. Ballots will begin going out on September 24, the same day early voting begins.

Once you receive your ballot, it must be returned by November 3, 2020 either in person at St. Clair County Courthouse or by mail. Officials will accept ballots by mail up to 15 days after the election, but they must be postmarked by November 3, 2020.

Voters can still cast their ballots in person on Election Day.

# Nutrition Vouchers Available For Senior Citizens Senior Farmers Market Nutrition



The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) provides lowincome seniors with coupons that can be exchanged for eligible

foods (fruits, vegetables, honey, and fresh-cut herbs) at farmers' markets, roadside stands, and community -supported agriculture programs.

Eligibility Guidelines/Household size:

- Individual \$1,967.00 Monthly
- Couple \$2,658.00 Monthly

Senior citizen must be at least 60 years old. All vouchers are valid through November 30<sup>th</sup>. Program vouchers are given out from June – September but participants will need to check with their farmers' market to determine how late in the season each one will be open as market dates differ. ### Is My Temperature Normal?

Many of us have by now had our "shot" temperature as entered a public place or visited the Senior Center. Many times, our temperature readings are below the old standard of 98.6. Remember the song with 98.6 in the chorus?

For example, my new normal is 97.3. Older adults have lower body temperatures than younger adults or children. Further, the average temperature seems to have fallen over the past hundred years, and



the new normal being closer to 97.5. Do we need a song re-write?

While 97.5 may be the new normal, it is worth considering whether our numbers are due to a condition that can cause an abnormally low body temperature, such as low thyroid or low cortisone. If these are normal, you can continue to wear clothing that keeps you comfortable, regardless of what others wear.

Finally, because your body temperature is low, and because people nearing or in their 80s often show less or no fever even with infection, take a low-grade fever seriously.



### The Elevator

One of our building amenities is the elevator system which is often taken for granted. What goes up, after all, must come down, and vice versa, right? Our elevator is not only for convenience,



but it is used to accommodate our clients that are unable to climb stairs and are essential for deliveries of supplies that we stored upstairs.

In June, the elevator suddenly stopped working as it has on numerous occasions. I contacted the company that has done the maintenance and repairs on the Montgomery equipment since 1985. They submitted a bid for repairs totaling \$11,310.00.

We were devastated by the huge repair cost. I am not sure if I can explain this correctly, but the elevator operates using hydraulic oil and the jack head packing and rings that hold the oil were worn out, leaking, and needed to be replaced.

This machine had just been inspected by the State of Illinois and we were receiving quarterly inspections. Why didn't someone notice that these rings were worn out?

I received an email from Village Hall clerk Lori Touchette suggesting I get other bids since this was over \$5,000. I immediately went to work and sent out packages to other elevator companies. Millstadt Street Department Maintenance Supervisor Scott Baltz met with crews from the companies that submitted bids.

We accepted the bid of \$2,288 from Century Elevator. Century came within a few days and had it up and running.

How could they have possibly done the same job for \$9,000 cheaper? I am glad as a taxpayer in Millstadt that we have municipal workers like Scott and Lori who are making sure our tax dollars are not wasted. We have all certainly learned more about elevators than we knew before.

# **AARP**Foundation

We would like to thank our volunteer tax preparers John Johnson, Pat Sharkey and their team that helped prepare taxes this year at Millstadt Township Senior Services. Millstadt volunteer MaryAnne Conrad helped keep all the appointments organized and called and notified everyone that we would not be able to take anymore appointments due to the COVID outbreak. Without volunteers who each year lend their time and talent this program would not be possible.

This year they were able to successfully submit 127 client tax returns. Using the average service, they helped these clients save approximately \$31,750 in fees. They also pushed back Federal refunds of \$95,852 and State refunds of \$7,675 largely by way of direct deposit.

Planning is underway among their staff and volunteer leaders for the 2021 season.

### **Healthier Food Options**

During this period of COVID-19, home is still the safest place to be. For that reason, eating at home has become a time of "what do we have to eat" and "when are you going to make it". Grocery shopping has become a time of preparing a meal list for a week, list ingredients and then speed shopping through the grocery store following the arrows on the floor, maintaining a social distance of 6 feet, and avoiding the store stockers and other shoppers, at the same time. Among shopping options are frozen, canned or dried produce, if fresh isn't available or practical. In these days of COVID-19, shopping its good to keep in mind options if the frozen item on your shopping list comes up empty at the grocery store. Choose canned fruit packed in water, light syrup or its own juice. With canned and frozen vegetables, choose the product with the lowest amount of sodium. Heavy syrups and sauces can add unwanted ingredients to your healthy fruits and If you want to avoid trying to follow directional arrows on the store aisles, I suggest trying the Millstadt Farmers Market on Friday afternoons.



# Pigs Don't Fly and Chickens Don't Swim




Given these two facts, pigs don't fly and neither chickens or pigs swim very well, how did these two common dinner table meats arrive in North America. Basically, they game aboard ships with their human migrators. Chickens most likely came first to the Americas via Polynesia at least 100 years before America was discovered. Later the Dutch and Portuguese slave traders brought chickens to North America from Africa, beginning in the 1600s. When granny came over from Germany in the early to mid-1800s she would bring young pigs and chickens for their eggs, food and trade.

For our pork steak providing pigs, they can be traced back to the early 1700s when the Spanish conquistadors brought the pig to the Georgia area.

The Spanish, Germans and French all knew they could keep chickens and pigs for food and trade and they were low maintenance creatures. They learned to live in the wild. The early colonists would be able to survive until they could acquire cows for milk or draft horses for farming.

We can also thank our German ancestors for bringing the tradition of charcuterie, smoking meats to the New World. Charcuterie, is actually a French word and from that comes charcuterie boards or "smoked" meat boards, often served at bars and restaurants.

So, you might say pigs and chickens arrived in tis country using public transportation.

### Sweet Potato & Sausage Hash

......

2 sweet potatoes, diced in 1-inch cubes

2 1/2 Tablespoons olive oil

½ yellow onion, diced

1 red bell pepper, diced

1 Tablespoon minced garlic

1 lb. Kielbasa or Andouille sausage; cut into ¼ inch slices

Salt and pepper to taste

Place sweet potatoes in a saucepan and cover with cold water; place over medium heat and bring to a boil. Cook sweet potatoes until just tender, 3-4 minutes; drain and dry.

Heat 1 tablespoon oil in large skillet over medium heat. Add onion, bell pepper, and garlic and sauté until golden, 5 to 6 minutes. Remove to a bowl. Add remaining oil to skillet and heat over medium heat; add sausage and sweet potatoes and cook, stirring occasionally, until sausage turns brown; increase heat and cook until sausage and sweet potatoes are crispy, 3-5 minutes. Return sautéed vegetable to the skillet and combine; taste and add salt and pepper to taste.

Suggestions; substitute Yukon gold potatoes for sweet potatoes; top each serving with poached or fried egg.



### **Instructions for "Fresh" Meals**

We hope you enjoy these fresh tasting meals. Our Meals on Wheels are specially prepared to be

fresh, safe, and nutritionally balanced for you. The meals provide 1/3 of your daily nutritional needs.

The meal is kept warm until delivered to your door, so you don't have to eat it immediately. You may

place the meal in the refrigerator and eat it when it is convenient for you.

Please follow directions for reheating in a microwave oven or in your regular conventional oven. Additional foods, such as bread or roll, fruit, dessert and milk, do not need to be reheated and come in a separate package. The label includes the packaging date. **INSTRUCTIONS** 

- REFRIGERATE the fresh meal as soon as it arrives, unless you plan to eat it immediately.
- When HEATING, vent the plastic sections with a fork or pull back the corner of each food section to vent. CAUTION! Steam will be HOT!
- To heat in a MICROWAVE: Heat the meal for 2-3 minutes on high or until the food reaches 165 degrees. (Begin with two minutes and increase the time if needed.)
- To heat in a CONVENTIONAL OVEN: Place the meal on a cookie sheet in the middle of the oven. Heat at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes.

CAUTION: NEVER use a toaster oven to heat your Meals on Wheels

### Remember Seat Belts

My first car had a steering wheel, gearshift, gas and brake pedal and four tires plus a spare. I was "Queen of the Road"! My new 1967 Cutlass had all those -plus seatbelts (lap type)! Oh, the consternation THAT item caused among the public! I put it on and kept driving. Made sense to me! I practiced nursing and saw accident victims who were DOA or worse injured/mutilated. Eventually our restraints became law restraining the torso and lap. "Click It or Ticket" is a catchy phrase. I believe restraints are shown to save lives. Some persons still resist wearing them!

Nowadays, we are encouraged to wear masks (cover nose and mouth) to save lives - to decrease the spread of the new viral diseases on the block. Will they PREVENT disease? They will decrease easy droplet/spittle transfers of the virus by speaking, snorting, sneezing, singing or shouting. I wear a mask when in public. Some people do not. Perhaps, part of the problem is that PEOPLE CANNOT SEE A GERM/a VIRUS!

When I taught Operating Room (OR) Nursing, I emphasized that that instruments, gowns and gloves had to be STERILE - free from germs. Germs are real! So too is a virus! Human eyes cannot see them in everyday life. OR staff wear scrubs, caps and masks. They wear sterile gowns/gloves and use sterilized instruments. I asked my students to imagine germs as cockroaches. Scrubs, caps, masks and sterile instruments were used to prevent GERMS (cockroaches) from getting into the body during brain, heart, gallbladder, hernia, prostate, knee etc. surgery. (Can you feel cockroaches crawling inside your body?)

Perhaps we should all visualize this new virus as a cockroach and try to prevent breathing/spitting our cockroaches onto other people/things. A new online slogan says, "Mask It or Casket." Maybe we should wear masks and pray for a vaccine. By Judy Jacobs

P.S. A face shield? How do I clean my spittle off the inside and your germs off the outside - think "cockroaches"? Can I bleach it? Alcohol wipe it? Or...?

P.P.S. A mask should cover your nose. AND, once the mask is on your face, only "touch" it to take it off. Otherwise you get "cockroaches" all over your hand!

August is tomato season at the Millstadt Farmers Market. A New Athens truck farmer has over 70 varieties of heirloom tomatoes planted on his irrigated truck farm. He had a sampling at the July markets and they were very tasty. Perfect for eating alone or with eggs or the



summer favorite, bacon lettuce and tomato sandwiches. Some of the varieties grown locally include Cherokee Purple, Brandywine, Green Zebra, German Pink, Yellow Pear and Paul Robeson.

An heirloom tomato, also called heritage tomato, is an open-pollinated, non-hybrid tomato. They usually have a shorter shelf live and have less disease resistance, than hybrids. They are grown for a variety of reasons, for taste, historical interest, access to wider varieties and by gardeners who save seeds from year to year.

While at the Millstadt Farmers Market, check out fresh baked goods, cut flower arrangements, locally raised honey and free- range eggs. Each week provides a different group of local vendors.
