

Name That Card!

Have you and your family found at home entertainment these past months? I have! My favorite pastime (when bored) is playing Solitaire. This reminded me of the terms "knave," "bauer" (bower), and "Jasz" accorded to the "Jack" in various card games. Moreover, I recalled that decks of cards originated in French, English, and other patterns. Various names were accorded to the kings and queens of each card suit. Allow me to share those frequently accorded to the kings and queens in the French pattern.

NAMES OF KINGS

DIAMONDS — Julius Caesar: both words are Roman family names; youthful, royalty; Caesar later became the words Czar/Kaiser.

SPADES – King David: from Hebrew meaning beloved; a king of Israel; aka St. Dewi who was a Welsch bishop and is patron saint of Wales.

HEARTS – Alexander the Great: from Greek meaning defender of men; King of Macedonia, conqueror of Greek city states and the Persian Empire.

CLUBS – Charlemagne: from French meaning manly; Charles the Great; Charles the First of the Franks and the Holy Roman Empire.

NAMES OF QUEENS

DIAMONDS – Rachel: from Hebrew and French meaning ewe/lamb; Jacob's favorite wife; mother of Joseph and Benjamin.

SPADES – Pallas: another name for Athena; the personification of wisdom, fertility, and prudent warfare.

HEARTS – Judith: from Hebrew meaning praised; a devout Jewess who decapitated an Assyrian commander (see the Apocryphal Book of Judith).

CLUBS – Argine: an anagram of the Latin word "regina" (queen); the only queen not holding a round petaled flower.

BIBLE TALK

JOY TO THE WORLD, THE LORD HAS COME!!!

Hello and blessings to all. Welcome to the Christmas study.

To begin this month's study, I would ask you to remember this truth: The Bible was written by men inspired by God. In God's Holy Word, he will tell us what he feels we have the need to know.

Now, to begin the truth, please read Matthew 2 as our focus today will be the Magi. We will be looking for the answer to two questions: (1). Who were the Magi? (2). What does God want us to know?

1. Scholars tell us they were priests who studied the stars and practiced the oldest recorded religion in the world, Zoroastrianism. They were aware of the Old Testament prophecy that a king would be born (Isaiah 7:14) and likely spent years watching for the "star". When the star appeared, they readied themselves for travel to find and worship the one called "king of the Jews". (Matt 2:2). Based on Matt 2:16-17, we assume the journey took about two years.

There is no mention as to the number of Magi. We call them three, based solely on the number of gifts. (We are never told what happened to the gifts.). The story of the Magi appears only in the Gospels once, Matt 2. The term "Magi" appears three times: Matt. 2:1, Matt. 2:7 and Matt. 2:16.

2. So, there you have it. This sweet story of patience, hope, love and faith. There is a lot of other research done regarding the Magi, but this is what God wants us to know. But why the Magi? What is God's point? For the answer, you need look no further than Matthew 2: 1-2.

After Jesus was born the Magi came from the east and asked: "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him".

And that's the point, they came from the east and were not Jews. For God so loved the world, he sent his son for all the people of the world. John 3:16.

Ice Box Cookie Recipe

1 cup butter

1 ½ cups sugar

1 egg

2 ½ cups flour

1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

¼ teaspoon salt

Candied red cherries

Red food coloring, 5-6 drops


Chocolate syrup, 1 tablespoon or to taste.

In a large mixing bowl, cream the butter and sugar. Beat in the egg. Combine the flour, baking powder and salt. Add to mixture. Divide the dough into 3 equal bowls. Add candied cherries and red food coloring to one bowl; chocolate syrup to a second bowl and leave the remaining one plain.

Line a 9x5x3 loaf pan with parchment paper. Spread the cherry dough over the bottom, cover with plain dough, then the chocolate layer. Or what ever order you want.

Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 2 hours.

Remove dough from pan, cut in half lengthwise. Cut cookies in ¼ inch slices and bake on a lightly greased sheet at 375 degrees for 10-12 minutes.



Illinois Secretary Of State News

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White on Tuesday announced that the expiration date for valid driver's licenses held by Illinois drivers who are 75 years of age or older has been extended for a period of one year past the licenses' current 2020 expiration date.

As a result, drivers age 75 and older with a 2020 driver's license expiration date do not need to visit a facility to renew their driver's license until shortly before their birthday in 2021.

Letters are being sent to drivers that qualify for this extension. The letter should be kept with the qualifying driver as further proof of the one-year extension. In addition, driving records on the Secretary of State's computer system have been updated to show the new 2021 expiration dates for qualified drivers, and law enforcement agencies both state and nationwide have been notified of the extended expiration dates.

White is reminding all other drivers that expiration dates for driver's licenses/ID cards and license plate stickers have been extended until Nov. 1, 2020. As a result, expired documents will remain valid until Nov. 1 so customers under age 75 do not need to rush into Driver Services facilities, especially during hot weather.

SS Benefits Increase in 2021

Nearly 70 million Americans will see a 1.3 percent increase in their Social Security benefits and SSI payments in 2021. Federal benefit rates increase when the cost-of-living rises, as measured by the Department of Labor's Consumer Price Index (CPI-W).


The CPI-W rises when inflation increases, leading to a higher cost-of-living. This change means prices for goods and services, on average, are a little more expensive, so the COLA helps to offset these costs.

January 2021 marks other changes that will happen based on the increase in the national average wage index. For example, the maximum amount of earnings subject to Social Security payroll tax in 2021 will be higher. The retirement earnings test exempt amount will also change in 2021. You can read our press release for more information at www.ssa.gov/news/press/factsheets/colafacts2021.pdf. We will mail COLA notices throughout the month of December to retirement, survivors, and disability beneficiaries, SSI recipients, and representative payees. Want to know your new benefit amount sooner? You can securely view and save the Social Security COLA notice online via the Message Center inside my Social Security in early December without waiting for the mailed notice.



OCTOBER 26, 2020

The meeting was called to order by Mike Todd, with the following trustees answering to roll call: Randy Burk, Mike Capell, Ray Famula, Mike French, Al Lehr, and Mark Todd. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. A motion was made by Al Lehr to approve the October 12th minutes. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. COMMITTEE ON ACCOUNTS: Mike Capell stated he reviewed the bills. Mike Capell made a motion to pay the bills. Mark Todd seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. PERSONNEL: Mike Capell stated the Village employee insurance yearly renewal needed to be approved. The total cost would be \$101.92 less per month than the previous year. Mike Capell made a motion to accept the Blue Cross Blue Shield Health Plan renewal at \$21,154.26 per month. Al Lehr seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. PUBLIC WORKS: SEWER: Al Lehr stated he talked with Brian. He is pressing sludge and doing general maintenance. He had to replace a bearing in the digestor pump. He hasn't heard back from the EPA yet. Mayor Todd stated he also talked with Brian about what is needed at the sewer plant. Scott Baltz stated he is meeting with him on Wednesday, October 28th at 1pm to go over his list. STREETS, ALLEYS, AND SIDEWALKS: Randy Burk stated he is working with Scott Baltz on additional paperwork for the first phase of the streetscape project. TWM wants the signed easement agreements sent to them. ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS: Mike French stated Resolution 20-09 is for the Time and Place of Holding Meetings. It is the schedule of the Village Board meetings in 2021. They will all be on the second and fourth Mondays of the month at 7pm at Village Hall. Mike French made a motion to accept Resolution 20-09 as presented. Al Lehr seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. ANNEXATIONS: Mayor Todd stated the signed documents from the property on Veterans Drive has been turned in. He will get them to Village Attorney Brian Flynn this week. Mayor Todd stated a land survey needs to be done on the Rodemich property that was annexed in recently. PARKS, POOL AND RECREATION: Mark Todd stated St. James has asked for a splash party donation for their annual dinner auction. The Village donated a splash party for their last dinner auction. Mark Todd made a motion to donate a splash party for the 33rd Annual St. James dinner auction on November 7th. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. **COMMUNITY** CENTER: Ray Famula stated they made 220 phone calls with the Telephone Reassurance Program in September. They received \$6,850 from AgeSmart for their participation in the program. Parking Lot Bingo was a success in October so they will have another event November 12th at Liederkranz Park. The Big Ol' Bag and Jewelry Sale netted \$955. Volunteers at the Senior Center are going to create a Veterans Wall with pictures to honor local Veterans on Veterans Day. LIHEAP applications will be available November 12th and they will help people fill them out. The Senior Center has 120 volunteers who did 4,256 hours of work during their fiscal year which saved the Center over \$42,000. Their goals for the next fiscal year are to have a survey process to gauge client satisfaction. They will also need two locking cabinets to keep Covid supplies secure. Their deep freeze quit working; the Knights of Columbus have pledged up to \$700 to replace it. The Center will be closed November 3rd for election day due to being an official polling place. The next Community Center Board meeting will be on Tuesday, November 17th at 6pm. PLANNING COMMISSION & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: Mike French stated the Planning Commission met and reviewed the Schaller development on North Polk Street. They recommended moving forward. The Zoning Board will review a zoning change and the plats will need to be approved. The next scheduled Planning Commission meeting will be Tuesday, November 17th at 7pm at Village Hall. 3 TIF: none PUBLIC SAFETY: Police Department - Police Chief Alan Hucke stated the deadline for the new officer applications was last Friday, October 23rd. He is reviewing the 18 applications they received. Emergency Service and Disaster Agency - Scott Baltz stated he talked with the siren company. They are going to give him information on how the sirens can be stacked and the coverage it would give. BUILDING COMMISSIONER: Adam Romero stated he has the preliminary plat map from Schaller and it will be ready for the approval at the next meeting. OLD BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated Hudson Tree Service is going to take the trees down at Liederkranz Park. It could be a few months before they are able to get to them. Mayor Todd stated he looked into pricing a new police car with Police Chief Alan Hucke. The price they received is good for at least four months. They will look into putting it in next year's budget. Mayor Todd stated Scott Baltz made sure the ball fields were aerated and weeded. Scott stated he will be looking into seeding them in spring 2021. Ray Famula asked if the Friends of the Old Water Tower received a new bid yet. Betty Keller Timmer answered they have not received it yet. Ray stated their last bid is six years old; they asked for an extension but what happens if a year from now it costs a great deal more than what they have raised. Mrs. Timmer answered that they will get creative and get it done. She stated they will get an updated bid. Scott Baltz stated the leaf


