

Thank You Floraville Community Grange 1918



In December Floraville Community Grange 1918 presented donations to the Millstadt Food Pantry and Millstadt Senior Center.

The Senior Center served 17,927 meals last year. The total cost to produce and deliver each meal is \$11.81 with grants, local government support, client contributions, donations and fund raisers we were short the cost of 758 meals. This is due to grant shortages and clients that are unable to pay full price for their meals. Through the generosity of the Grange we will be able to help cover these costs.



Head -em Up - - Drive-em Out - -

"No lazy days for you, young man. Your cousin's husband needs drovers. And, I have hired you on. Get your kit together."

Such were a mother's words to her 13 year old son about 1911. And, of course, he gathered his kit and walked down the lane to join the drovers. A cattle/ horse trader in Southern Illinois always needed help getting a herd to the stockyards. The trader supplied the drovers with mounts – mules or donkeys, but seldom horseflesh (riding lessons were not part of the deal).

Cattle were not herded/driven very fast - did not want to run the meat off them. During the day, the several drovers kept the herd plodding onward and convinced stragglers not to stray. At night, shifts of drovers kept the cattle in their make-shift corral on fields near the roadway, while others got some sleep. In the morning, they broke camp and headed the cattle northward again.

Drovers "ate dust" as they urged the cattle onward. Creeks would be forded. Roadway bridges were great for crossing rivers – especially the Kaskaskia. Moving the herd meant cracking whips over their heads and into their flanks to steer the steers the correct direction. (Shades of "Rawhide.") The grown-ups (men) had a rifle or shotgun along – mainly to scare off foxes, roaming dogs or wolves, or . . . especially at night when the herd was bedded down.

Three or four days and nights riding and camping out on the trail could get interesting. But, eventually, the herd moved through E. St. Louis and on north to the stockyards. END OF THE TRAIL!

Sounds like a "cool" way to earn summer money! The CATCH?

Mother got the money to help the family finances. She signed son up to ride out again.

Perfect Potato Soup

- 1 large potato per person
- 1/4 c. celery per person, diced
- 1/2 % x 2 %

🗶 ¼ c. carrot per person, diced

1 slice thin bacon per person.

- Cut into 1 inch pieces.
- ¼ c. milk per person
- ¹/₂ c. low sodium chicken broth per person
- Peel and dice potatoes boil just until soft, drain water. Cook bacon until crisp remove most of grease, add onion, carrot, and celery to pan cook 3-5 minutes. Add potatoes, milk, chicken broth and salt & pepper to taste. Allow the soup to cook over medium-high heat for 5-10 minutes.
- Remove half to 2/3 of the soup and blend in batches in a blender/food processor until completely smooth. Soup is hot! Allow to cool
- before blending, if possible.

Serve in bowls garnished with parsley, grated
 cheese, or crisp bacon pieces.

SHIP Corner



Millstadt Township Senior Center is SENIOR HEALTH a sponsoring agency for Senior Health Insurance Program help and

we recently received our 2016 updated Manual. During the coming months I will be sharing with you some information that I feel is important and informational.

Organization and Administration of the SHIP Program: SHIP was initiated in July of 1988 by the Illinois Department of Insurance in response to the needs of Illinois' senior citizens regarding their health insurance. In April of 2013, under Executive Order by the Governor, SHIP was transferred to the Illinois Department on Aging.

The organizational structure of SHIP consists of:

• The **Illinois Department on Aging**, which provides initial training, continuing education and ongoing support of SHIP counselors;

• The sponsoring organization (Millstadt Township Senior Services), which provides coordinators, office space and office support services;

• The **coordinator (Patty Evansco)**, who is responsible for the administrative aspects of the SHIP program, which include publicizing SHIP services, recruiting volunteers, scheduling counseling sessions and responding to counselors' needs; and

• Counselor Patty Evansco meets with clients individually to provide objective information about health insurance, advocacy assistance, or referral if appropriate.

The state is divided geographically into four separate SHIP regions: Cook County, Northern Illinois, Central Illinois and Southern Illinois. Within each region, counselors are organized in to units that serve a specific geographic area, usually designated by counties.

The Commodity Supplemental Food FOODOANK Program (CSFP) is a supplemental food source for seniors age 60 and older who fall within 130% of the federal poverty guidelines—seniors may participate in this program while also receiving food assistance via food pantries, meals on wheels, and/or SNAP (food stamps). The Foodbank partners with an organization that elects to administer the CSFP boxes to qualified seniors. Millstadt Township Senior Services would receive a once a month free delivery of free boxes to be distributed to the seniors signed up for the program; each box contains about 16 shelf stable items, plus cheese. The program does require some administrative work including, application sign up and verification of seniors, maintenance of sign-in sheets, and re-certification of participants that may be conducted verbally every 6 months.






