Well, summer is half over. Could someone please talk to the time makers and ask them to slow that clock down. I hope you are all having a fun summer and it hasn't been too hard to stay cool.

I want to talk to you this month about the cost of our Meals. A

few months ago, we had an increase in the cost of the meal from our supplier. With this increase our total cost for Congregate meals are \$9.84 each and Meals on Wheels are \$11.36 each.

The price includes cost of the meal, milk, drinks, snacks, fruit, Meals on Wheels containers, allocations of Rachel, Larry and my salaries per program. We receive \$3.50 reimbursement for Congregate and \$3.60 for Meals on Wheels from Department of Aging. We collect from you an average of \$3.19 per meal for Congregate meals and \$2.42 for Home Delivered these amounts are totally contributions and should be only what you can afford with \$4.50 only a suggestion. We get \$18,000 from the Township and that is \$.97 per meal based on 18,704 meals served last year. We get \$15,000 from the Village and this is \$.81 per meal. This year we have also received \$6,000 from the Sandra M Bereitschaft Foundation for home delivered meals or \$.71 per meal. This leaves a balance of \$1.37 per Congregate Meal unpaid, and \$2.85 per Home Delivered Meal.

We make up this difference with Donations, Memorials and Fundraisers. This is getting more difficult than it used to be. There are many organizations that are having fundraisers to survive and so we must compete with them. Sometimes many people are the same people but different clubs. Last year we had 10,265 Congregate Meals so our balance to raise is \$14,063 for them and \$24,051 for the 8,439 Home Delivered Meals. A total of \$38,114! I realize this was a lot of information but felt the need to explain our reasoning behind so many fundraisers. We are fortunate that our community is so incredibly supportive!

The Sandra Marie Bereitschaft Foundation and Mertz Motors held their first annual "drive 4 Ur Community' fundraiser. The fundraiser is where people go to Mertz's for one day and test drive a Ford vehicle. In return Ford Motors will donate \$20.00 per test driver towards the Sandra Marie Bereitschaft Foundation.

According to Debbie Mertz who helped organize the event this is a fundraiser that's free to everyone financially, all this fundraiser takes is your time.

"The Foundation helps to fund the Meals on Wheels program at the Millstadt Senior Center," owner Don Mertz said. "The last few years have been up and down with the State of Illinois funding uncertainty, but it's really nice because the money is 100% funded by Ford. We actually donated the space, the time, and some employees to help with it."

SMB Foundation President Jim Bereitschaft said he hopes in the years to come the fundraiser will grow with more people test driving Ford vehicles and more money being donated by Ford Motors Company in return. This year we had 102 people show up and the funding stays directly here locally and will be spent to support Meals on Wheels in Millstadt, Smithton, Paderborn and Freeburg.

Mertz Motors and the Sandra Marie Bereitschaft Foundation is hoping Ford Motors will keep the 'Drive 4 Ur Community' fundraiser for 2018. So, they can keep providing funds for the Meals on Wheels in the coming years.






McDaniel and Bill McDaniel of Millstadt.



Social Security Sidebar

Question:

Are Social Security numbers reassigned after a person dies?

Answer:

No. We do not reassign Social Security numbers. In all, we have assigned more than 460 million Social Security numbers. Each year we assign about 5.5 million new numbers. There are over one billion combinations of the nine-digit Social Security number. As a result, the current system has enough new numbers to last for several more generations. For more information about Social Security, visit our website at www.socialsecurity.gov.

Disability Question:

I have been getting Social Security disability benefits for many years. I'm about to hit my full retirement age. What will happen to my disability benefits?

Answer:

When you reach "full retirement age" we will switch you from disability to retirement benefits. But you won't even notice the change because your benefit amount will stay the same. It's just that when you reach retirement age, we consider you to be a "retiree" and not a disability beneficiary. To learn more, visit our website at www.socialsecurity.gov.

Medicare Question:

How do I apply for *Extra Help* with Medicare prescription drug plan costs?

Answer:

You have several options for applying. You can:

Apply online by visiting www.socialsecurity.gov/medicare/prescriptionhelp;

• Call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) to apply over the phone or request an application; or

Apply at any local Social Security office.

Anyone who has Medicare can get Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage. Some people with limited resources and income are eligible for *Extra Help* to pay for the costs — monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co-payments — related to a Medicare prescription drug plan. Solar Eclipse - August 21

Mark August 21 on your calendar now to experience one of nature's most unique occurrences, when a total solar eclipse will of stretch across the country, reaching its point of greatest duration in southern Illinois just south of Carbondale.

The total eclipse means the moon will completely blot out the sun as it makes its orbit, making it look like the nighttime in the middle of the afternoon. The eclipse will last for about 2.5 minutes at peak viewing locations, including Carbondale, Chester, and Murphysboro. At locations slightly farther out of its direct path, such as Waterloo, Harrisburg, and Metropolis, it will be visible for a minute or two.

Be sure to wear proper eye protection if you plan on watching the eclipse, and learn more at eclipse.siu.edu.

Aging Boomer Population

There are 10,000 people turning 65 every single day in this country for the next 20 years. How are we going to help this growing population stay healthy and in their homes? It's not possible to build 10,000 assistant care or nursing home rooms a day. Other low cost alternatives are needed to fill the void. The local Meals on Wheels program provides the ability for many of our seniors to stay in their homes at a much lower cost than using taxpayer money to pay for assisted care. The Meals on Wheels program is a low-cost, cost-effective program supported by state, federal, village, and township funds in addition to fund raisers, donations and the many hours donated by volunteers. The annual budget for the Millstadt Senior Center, which includes the Meals on Wheels program, congregate meals, Medicare and Medicaid programs and transportation, is just over \$235,000 per year for services to 500 clients in the Millstadt, Smithton, and Freeburg area.

We've heard of cuts to Senior Programs at the Federal level because elected officials in Washington claim they have no evidence senior food programs are effective. A budget of \$235,000 that supports local businesses, from the IGA, to Breadaux's, gas stations, and provides jobs for people working at these locations and at the Senior Center. Do the math on this, how many months in an assistant care facility or nursing home does \$235,000 cover.

The next time you are asked on a survey, questionnaire or see an elected official and they ask what is important to you, tell them, programs that do good and save our tax dollars. Tell them the good the Millstadt Senior program does in Millstadt and to NOT reduce the federal and state programs for the Meals on Wheels program.

Monarch Butterfly Program

As its name implies, the monarch butterfly is often considered the king or queen of all butterflies. And to this end, a third-grader from Decatur suggested in 1974 that the monarch butterfly should become our Illinois State Insect. Schoolchildren around the state then lobbied for the monarch butterfly and the General Assembly passed a bill making it official in 1975. Since that time, however, it has also been determined that the number of monarchs being observed has greatly diminished. Ned Siegel, Belleville, will present a program on "The Life and Times of the Monarch Butterfly" during the monthly meeting of the Millstadt Historical Society to be held at 7:30pm on Tuesday, July 25th, at the Millstadt Community Center. Ned is a volunteer speaker from the University of Illinois Extension's Master Naturalist program.

Commodity Supplemental The Program (CSFP) St. Louis Area Foodbank supplemental food source for seniors age 60 and older who fall within 130% of the federal poverty guidelines—seniors may participate in this program while also receiving food assistance via food meals on wheels, and/or SNAP (food stamps). The Foodbank partners with an organization that elects to administer the CSFP boxes to qualified seniors. Millstadt Township Senior Services would receive a once a month free delivery of free boxes to be distributed to the seniors signed up for the program; each box contains about 16 shelf stable items, plus cheese. The program does require some administrative work including, application sign up and verification of seniors, maintenance of sign-in sheets, and re-certification of participants that may be

conducted verbally every 6 months. If you are interested in signing up for this program and fit into the income guidelines below, please contact Patty



Knowing who is at lunch at the Center is important for a number of reasons. First of all it's good to keep track so if someone isn't there for a few days we can contact them to make sure everything is ok. Second, when you sign in and are registered we are able to submit your name to receive our grant money to help pay for the meals. A way to look at it is that if you aren't registered and signed in we can't send a bill for your lunch to the Area Agency on Aging.

Millstadt Township Senior Center SENIOR HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRESSION Health Insurance Program help

and we recently received our 2017 updated Manual. During the coming months I will be sharing with you some information that I feel is important and informational.

Organization and Administration of the SHIP Program: SHIP was initiated in July of 1988 by the Illinois Department of Insurance in response to the needs of Illinois' senior citizens regarding their health insurance. In April of 2013, under Executive Order by the Governor, SHIP was transferred to the Illinois Department on Aging.

The organizational structure of SHIP consists of:

- The **Illinois Department on Aging**, which provides initial training, continuing education and ongoing support of SHIP counselors;
- The sponsoring organization (Millstadt Township Senior Services), which provides coordinators, office space and office support services;
- The coordinator (Patty Evansco), who is responsible for the administrative aspects of the SHIP program, which include publicizing SHIP services, recruiting volunteers, scheduling counseling sessions and responding to counselors' needs; and
- Counselor Patty Evansco meets with clients individually to provide objective information about health insurance, advocacy assistance, or referral if appropriate.

The state is divided geographically into four separate SHIP regions: Cook County, Northern Illinois, Central Illinois and Southern Illinois. Within each region, counselors are organized in to units that serve a specific geographic area, usually designated by counties.






