Nutrition Vouchers Available For Senior Citizens Senior Farmers Market Nutrition



Program

The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) provides lowincome seniors with coupons that can be exchanged for eligible

foods (fruits, vegetables, honey, and fresh-cut herbs) at farmers' markets, roadside stands, and community -supported agriculture programs.

Eligibility Guidelines/Household size:

- Individual \$1,967.00 Monthly
- Couple \$2,658.00 Monthly

Senior citizen must be at least 60 years old. All vouchers are valid through November 30th. Program vouchers are given out from June – September but participants will need to check with their farmers' market to determine how late in the season each one will be open as market dates differ. Seniors are eligible for 1 voucher per year. Vouchers are first come first serve. For more information contact Patty Evansco at (618) 476-3731 or seniorce@htc.net.

For the past several months all meals served from the Millstadt Township Senior Center have been served in take-out containers called "Olivers". Some days 120 meals are delivered by MOWS volunteer drivers or meals maybe pre-ordered and picked-up at the Senior Center. The meal containers can be a significant cost when 2000 are used each month. The Sandra M. Bereitschaft Foundation recently donated \$1,600 to the Millstadt Senior Center for the purchase of "Olivers". COVID 19-2020 Style

The year 2020 and COVID-19 will forever be linked together and written and discussed for as long as history will exist. And why not? Think how our lives have changed since March 2020.

Imagine no more "Kiss Cams" at sporting events. No more spitting in baseball, along with no crying according to Tom Hanks in "A League of Their Own". How will vendors serve their customers? With a sixfoot passing server? Third base coaches will face a new challenge of flashing signs without touching their face.

Schools may operate on a split schedule with some students attending Monday, Wednesday, Friday others Tuesday and Thursday and then alternate the following week. Some classes may be held on-line.

Grocery shopping has changed from 3-4 times a week to once every 2-3 weeks. More shopping is done online and food delivery services and drive-through windows are now everywhere. Want a donut, drive through and get a dozen to go.

Don't dress for work, Zoom instead or Skype or whatever does not require clothing from the waist down. Fuzzy slippers were also optional.

Longer hair has come back in style. Not necessarily because a new style was wanted but hair stylists were viewed as non-essential for almost 3 months.

Baking has become a new passion for some. Flour and yeast in many stores were hard to find for several weeks. Homemade bread and pizza dough became specialties for those wanting to test their culinary skills.

How has Millstadt, or more specifically zip code 62260, faired during this pandemic? On June 27 the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 215 were tested for the virus and 13 were reported having been infected. With a population of 7,290 reported in zip code 62260 that reflects a testing rate of less than 3%. The important number is the number of deaths reported, zero.

Many of us are still staying close to home and wearing a mask when out in public. This is not going away for a while, so let's be safe. Wear a mask and wash your hands. It's that simple.



Sanitizing Station

This month we received a new "Sanitizing Station" from AgeSmart Community Resources. This station is a sanitary way to help prevent the spread of germs and sanitize the hands of people around you. The hand sanitizing station is equipped with non-alcoholic hand sanitizer that kills germs within 30 seconds. This station will be used as you enter our building through the front door. It will be stationed inside the front door. Our policy is to screen everyone that enters the building. After their screening everyone is required to hand sanitize and have their temperature taken. If you have a temperature over 100 degrees you will not be allowed to enter the building. These procedures are to protect you as well as others. Thank you AgeSmart for this gift.



Instructions for "Fresh" Meals

We hope you enjoy these fresh tasting meals. Our Meals on Wheels are specially prepared to be fresh, safe, and nutritionally balanced for you. The meals provide 1/3 of your daily nutritional needs. The meal is kept warm until delivered to your door, so you don't have to eat it immediately. You may place the meal in the refrigerator and eat it when it is convenient for you.

Please follow directions for reheating in a microwave oven or in your regular conventional oven. Additional foods, such as bread or roll, fruit, dessert and milk, do not need to be reheated and come in a separate package. The label includes the packaging date. INSTRUCTIONS

- REFRIGERATE the fresh meal as soon as it arrives, unless you plan to eat it immediately.
- When HEATING, vent the plastic sections with a fork or pull back the corner of each food section to vent. CAUTION! Steam will be HOT!
- To heat in a MICROWAVE: Heat the meal for 2-3 minutes on high or until the food reaches 165 degrees. (Begin with two minutes and increase the time if needed.)
- To heat in a CONVENTIONAL OVEN: Place the meal on a cookie sheet in the middle of the oven. Heat at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes.

CAUTION: NEVER use a toaster oven to heat your Meals on Wheels





Sheet Pan Pancakes

Any left-over pancake squares can be frozen individually in plastic wrap and place in a large zip lock freezer bag. May be frozen for up to two months. To reheat: unwrap from plastic and heat in microwave on High for 30-45 seconds.

- 1 ¾ cups all- purpose flour
- 2 Tbsp. granulated sugar
- 1½ tsp. baking powder
- 1 ¼ tsp. kosher salt
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 2 cups whole buttermilk
- 2 large eggs
- ½ tsp. vanilla
- 4 Tbsp. butter, melted
- 1 ½ cps slice fresh strawberries
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Stir together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda in large bowl. Whisk together buttermilk, eggs and vanilla in a medium bowl. Gradually stir buttermilk mixture into flour mixture. Gently stir in the melted butter. Do not overmix, the batter will be lumpy.
- 2. Pour batter into lightly greased 15 x 10-inch rimmed baking sheet. Bake in preheated oven 7 minutes; sprinkle evenly with strawberries. Continue baking until golden brown and a wooden pick inserted into thickest part comes out clean 15-18 additional minutes.

Other toppings could be substituted for strawberries for example; blueberries, semisweet chocolate chips with almonds; raspberries and powdered sugar; or thinly sliced apples with cinnamon and pecans. Add your own toppings or divide the pancake into halves or quarters and select a different topping for each section.

Covid-19 Reopening Procedures And Summer Reading

The Millstadt Library's number one priority is to provide access to materials and resources you need to accomplish your goals. In order to do so, we also have to take your health and safety into account.

During pandemic times, we have to listen to all of the governing bodies set before us; the American Library Association, the Illinois Library Association, Illinois Heartland Library System, St. Clair County Health Department and the State of Illinois. These organizations put forward their best guidelines for the overall health and well-being of our patrons.

According to their guidelines, we have prepared our own best interpretations in how best to serve you. Even if we're unable to provide physical materials for check-out or our other physical resources.

During Phase 3 of Restore Illinois, the library is closed to patrons except for limited "by appointment" situations. Below is the information you need to know in using our Curbside services during Phase 3.

Curbside Pick-Up Rules/Regulations for Patrons

- Complete the curbside pickup order by placing a hold through your library account, which can be accessed at www.millstadt-library.org at Your Account, found under bookmarks. Be sure to limit items by "My Library."
- - OR by calling 476-1887. Orders can be placed at anv time.
- •Temporary library cards are available to residents who live in the Village on our website.
- Families should place orders together. There is a limit of 10 items per card.
- Please visit our website for more information.
- Requests for specific items can be made, but they may not be available during this time. Library staff are happy to select different items based on your preferences.

When Illinois goes into Phase 4 of Restore Illinois, the library will resume to regular hours, but will follow CDC guidelines to the effect of only allowing six people into the library at a time, having six-foot designated areas, a mandatory mask policy and the continuation of quarantining materials.

Please keep in mind that all materials available will only be items from the Millstadt Library until the aforementioned governing bodies are able to continue interlibrary material sharing. The meeting was called to order by Mike Todd, with the following trustees answering to roll call: Randy Burk, Mike Capell, Ray Famula, Mike French, Al Lehr, and Mark Todd. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. A motion was made by Mike French to approve the May 26th minutes. Ray Famula seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

COMMUNICATIONS OR CORRESPONDENCE: none COMMITTEE ON ACCOUNTS: Mike Capell stated he reviewed the bills. Mike Capell made a motion to pay the bills. Mark Todd seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. PUBLIC WORKS: SEWER: Al Lehr stated he had talked with Brian; everything is running fine at the sewer plant. He is pressing sludge and doing general maintenance.

WATER: Al Lehr stated Brian had to replace a bearing in one of the pump houses. Scott Baltz stated he signed a contract for \$1,990 to have both water towers inspected. REFUSE: Tracy Holmes stated trash pick up has been horrible the last two weeks. She talked to the Waste Management manager last week and was told that there is so much trash they can't keep up and are behind. She asked them to call the office or send an email if they know pick up is going to be late so that the office can let residents know. Tracy stated they haven't been picking up a third of the town when they're supposed to.

STREETS, ALLEYS AND SIDEWALKS: Randy Burk stated he met with Scott Baltz about some issues in town. They agreed some work needs to be done on East Mill Street.
