

The Millstadt Senior Center once again will be participating in Operation Food Search. Operation Food Search is a Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) a Senior Food assistance Program.

What is the CSFP?

The Illinois Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) works to improve the health of older persons at least 60 years of age by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA commodity foods. CSFP food packages do not provide a complete diet, but rather are good sources of the nutrients typically lacking in the diets of the target population. These include vitamins A and C, calcium and iron.

How does the program operate?

USDA purchases food and makes it available to IDHS along with

funds for administrative costs. IDHS distributes the food to public

and non-profit private local agencies from the USDA distribution

center. Local agencies determine the eligibility of applicants,

distribute the foods, and provide nutrition education. Local

agencies also provide referrals to other welfare, nutrition, and

health care programs such as WIC, food stamps, Medicaid, and

Medicare.

What are the requirements to get food through CSFP? Elderly must reside in the state of Illinois. Older persons must have income at or below 130 percent of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines.

What foods are provided to participants?

Food packages include a variety of foods, such as non-fat dry milk, evaporated milk, juice, hot or ready-to-eat cereal, rice or pasta, peanut butter or dry beans or peas, canned meat or poultry or tuna or salmon or egg mix, and canned fruits and vegetables.

The Millstadt Senior Center will be assisting in signing up candidates for the Food

Search Program on Tuesday, June 11th and Thursday June 13th. An application has been enclosed with this newsletter.

Evelyn told stories of how they would play "Chalk the Arrow" all around town. When she was growing up her mother would always fix a special meal and cake. When she was a freshman in high school her family took a memorable trip to Florida and how they enjoyed singing together as a family. Her first job was working for her dad at his shoe repair shop. She said that she came to always trust and depend on her parents. Her favorite dances were doing a polka and a waltz. Her chores included helping her mom hang out the clothes on the line and the only thing she didn't like about school was walking to school in the winter months

Betty Keller Timmerman

Betty told about how her dad worked at the Coal mine and their favorite entertainment was visiting their relatives on Otten Road. Betty described the weekly newspaper in town and that she applied for a job there and was hired. She was paid \$10 per job. Her first car was a 1977 Dodge Aspen that she got when she was 19 years old. Betty's dream job was to be a teacher, but worked in accounting most of her life. She explained that when she was growing up the telephone numbers began with the prefix of GR which stood for Greenfield, so the Senior Center telephone number would be Greenfield 7-3731.



The Best Companion Pets for Seniors

An animal can bring joy to an older person. Here's a guide to finding an affordable, compatible pet.

One of the hardest parts of growing old is loneliness. When you are without a spouse or children around to keep you company, you can begin to feel isolated. This is where pets come in.

Studies have shown time and again that companion animals have the ability to lift the spirits of people who live alone and provide unconditional friendship and enrichment.

Yet caring for a pet long term is not to be entered into lightly. It's essential to choose the right animal, one that will be both compatible and affordable for an older owner.

If you think an elderly friend or family member would be happier with a pet around, here are the basics to get you started.

Please always discuss getting a pet in detail, and ensure your loved one or their caretaker is 100% on-board with the idea. **Never buy an animal as a surprise** — that rarely ends well.

1. Choosing the right animal

Finding the right pet to fit a person's lifestyle and energy level is crucial.

Dogs can make wonderful pets, but they require daily walking, leadership, and more care than other companion animals.



This makes a dog well-suited for an active senior who enjoys walking outdoors, who can bend and pick up after their pet. An adult dog already housetrained would be easier to match to an older person's lifestyle than a rambunctious puppy.

Cats are easier to care for and make excellent pets for seniors.

On a daily basis, a cat requires a good diet, a litter box, a few toys and human companionship. And a senior who lives alone will have plenty of time to devote to a pet kitty.

Birds can be fantastic pets for the elderly. Some species require very little hands-on care aside from feeding, watering and switching out the paper in their cages.

Canaries and finches are lovely little birds that prefer not to be handled, so they're great for adding lively sound and movement to the environment. Parrots tend to be louder and more demanding, but many enjoy physical contact with owners.

2. Considering the costs

Since many seniors live on limited incomes, it's essential to consider an owner's ability to pay for a pet's basic needs.

Starting expenses include the adoption or purchase costs, spaying or neutering, vaccinations and a cage or crate. Regular expenses will include food, toys, vet visits, preventive medications and grooming.

The American Pet Products Association says routine vet visits cost dog owners \$257 in 2017, while cat owners paid an average of \$182. Basic food for either type of animal cost \$235 last year.

Larger animals are more expensive to feed. Though birds may be less expensive to care for day to day, if they get ill, the specialized medical costs are comparable to what you'd pay to care for a cat or dog.

3. Arranging for care

An older person may get a demanding pet, like a dog, and be fine for a few years but later lose the ability to care for their pet. For seniors who need help with pet care, a daily dog walker or twice-weekly cage cleaning is another cost to consider.

If a helper is already coming to the home a few times a week, then you could ask if they would be OK with adding a quick bird cage paper swap or litter box cleaning into their schedule.

Or, a willing family member could perform these sorts of helpful tasks to keep an older loved one enjoying the benefits of pet ownership.

4. Looking at alternatives to pets

But let's be completely realistic: Pet ownership isn't for everybody. The good news is that if a senior can't afford to keep an animal at home, there are other ways to interact with furry or feathered friends and reap all of the benefits of socializing with pets.

Often, shelters and animal rescues need volunteers to care for animals on-site, or to foster them at home temporarily before they find new owners.

Pet therapy programs in your town may offer opportunities to spend time with animals without having to own one. These programs might even come to your home or senior center for free!

This issue also includes recipes to prepare "spargel" a.k.a. asparagus. I recall driving through Germany from "zimmer to zimmer" and finally learning that the acres filled with rows of heaped earth were actually asparagus fields. Farmers kept heaping earth over the rows of plants to keep the plants "in the dark" as they grew - thus, producing plenty of white asparagus, a German favorite. 

You've probably seen the sign for the original Lambert's: Home of the Throwed Rolls. And yes, they really do throw rolls there. Somehow, they seem to know what kind of throw to toss, so very few rolls wind up on the floor.

On Wednesday, April 17th Glenda Skidis, Pat Morris, Betty Schranz, Jean Siegfried, Lucille Reese, Norma Burleson, Doris Adams, Homer and Betty Duncan, Pat Schaefer, Linda Whelan, and Carol Ashton left Millstadt Senior Center on the bus. They were chauffeured by volunteer Charlie Todd to Sikeston, Missouri for lunch and shopping.

They were sitting at their table, innocently watching the toy train circle the room near the ceiling. Suddenly there was a flash of golden brown that caught their attention and they quit talking and looked away from the train to see HIM. Standing there, legs set wide, carrying a tray of rolls like Atlas holding up the world, the roll thrower waited to see their hands rise. From across the room he threw them a toasty, hot roll and nailed every throw. Among other attractions were the pass-arounds that included macaroni and tomatoes, fried okra and fried potatoes.



Asparagus Puff

Crust

¾ C water

6 Tbls butter

34 Cup flour

½ tsp salt

3 eggs

¼ C grated parmesan cheese

Topping

1pound Asparagus, cut into 1inch pieces

2 C chopped ham

2 Tbls butter

2 Tbls flour

1 ½ C milk

½ C shredded swiss cheese

2 Tbls parmesan cheese

½ tsp salt

¼ tsp pepper

Bring water and butter to a boil. Stir in flour and salt till it form into a ball. Let rest 5 Minutes. Stir in eggs 1 at a time. Stir in 3 Tbls parmesan cheese. Grease pie plate. Drop by tablespoon around the pie plate. Sprinkle with 1 Tbls Parmesan cheese. Bake at 400° for 30-35 minutes.

Topping

Cook asparagus in microwave for 3 minutes. Melt Butter. Stir in flour. Cook 1-2 minutes. Add Milk. Cook till thickened. Stir in cheeses until melted. Stir in salt and pepper, asparagus and ham. Place on top of crust. ENJOY!

Village Board of Millstadt Meeting April 22, 2019

Cable Service and Cell Tower: Village will go with 20 year lease extension with American Tower Cell Tower. The 20 year extension comes with a \$30,000 signing bonus. HTC, Sprint, and Verizon all use the tower. The Village had other offers but this is the best option. The 20 year lease includes rent in the amount of \$2,100, and additional four 5 year renewal terms. New expiration date will be July 31, 2045.

Streets, Alleys and Sidewalks: Resident voiced concern on sewer and curb project on South Jackson Street between West Laurel and W. White Street. Street is a mess and no work has been done on project for a month. Street is like a roller coaster and parking along area is difficult. Mayor Todd replied street would be roto milled and then oiled and chipped this summer.

Ordinances and Resolutions: Mike French stated Resolution 19-05 is for taking the recommendation on Good Energy Electrical as the agent to purchase electricity for the Village. Motion carried unanimously.

Mike French stated Resolution 19-06 is for taking the recommendation of Good Energy Gas for the Village. Motion carried unanimously.

Old Business: Village received grant for streetscape for the first 2 blocks of West Washington Street. That will include in front of Circle K and Subway. The project will go out for bids in the spring of 2020 and construction will start the summer of 2020.



The Lost Girls of Paris

This novel, while fictional, provides a bit of history that few readers are aware of. It tells the story of a group of female secret agents deployed from London to occupied Europe during WWII.

The author Pam Jenoff, said her greatest inspiration was, the heroism of the women and the desire to amplify the legacy of their contribution to the war.

Two other pieces of history compelled Jenoff to write the novel: first, the fact

that (Britain's Special Operations Executive; SOE) networks collapsed resulting in arrests, disappearances and, in some cases deaths of both male and female agents. Second, while the downfall of SOE networks has been well documented, many questions remain about how they were compromised and betrayed, and Jenoff wanted to explore that aspect in her novel.

While Jenoff writes historical fiction, the themes of female empowerment and sisterhood, loss and redemption, are still relevant today.

Rock Steady Boxing Information and Demonstration Thursday, June 13, 2019

10:00 am Millstadt Township Senior Services

Rock Steady Boxing is an exercise program, the first and only of its kind, to dramatically improve the abilities of people with Parkinson's and help them continue live to independent as possible.

The Rock Steady Boxing classes are currently held at the Senior Services Plus Wellness Center in Alton,



Illinois and are designed to attack the disease at its vulnerable neurological points. The program is focused on total body fitness and will include many different types of exercises, though the program is primarily centered on boxing skills that are noncontact boxing based fitness curriculum. Senior Services Plus is the first to bring this program to the region and Millstadt Senior Center Director Patty Evansco hopes there is interest to start this program at the Millstadt Center.

There has been many studies conducted to support that rigorous exercise, emphasizing gross motor skills, balance, core strength, and rhythm can positively impact our range of motion, flexibility, posture, and gate. There also are many studies to show that this style exercise is "neuro-protective," which means that it is a type of exercise that may actually slow the disease progression.

I am excited for this opportunity to help our community. We would like to add a Parkinson's Support Group every month

Rock Steady Boxing was founded in 2006 by a former Indiana county prosecutor, Scott C. Newman, who is living with Parkinson's.

The seed for what would eventually become Rock Steady Boxing was planted when Newman began intense, one-on-one, boxing training just a few years after he was diagnosed with early-onset Parkinson's at the age of 40. Newman witnessed the dramatic improvement in his physical health, agility and daily functioning through the intense and high energy workouts.

Newman's quality of life improved dramatically in a short time due to his fighting back against Parkinson's disease. Private donations and a personal passion to help others living with Parkinson's allowed Newman to open a small gym and boxing ring in a donated corner of a corporate employee gym as Rock Steady's first home.

Former world-champion professional boxer Kristy Rose Follmar was hired (and remains today) as the head trainer. Follmar made invaluable contributions to build the Rock Steady program during its infancy. Her professional experience as a boxer and fitness trainer, along with her infectious enthusiasm for helping those with Parkinson's, continues to help the program steadily

As word of this unique program spread and the demand for the classes increased, Rock Steady created training programs to meet the fitness levels at all stages of Parkinson's — from the newly diagnosed to those who had been living with it for decades plus.





Not only are we able to supply necessary food, but the driver delivering the meal is able to ascertain how the client is getting along and share some companionship. We have a number of folks dedicated to providing these services. They give freely of their time and energy to deliver the meals, make contact with the recipient and report back to the Center. The majority of the "regular" drivers volunteer one day per week and most have said it is highly rewarding for them.

Lunch Program Lunch is served Monday through Friday at 12 noon. You must be 60 years of age or older to qualify for this program. It is appreciated that if you want lunch you call the center by 3:00 pm in order to sign up for lunch on the following day. When you come in you may sign yourself up for the next day. If you like, you may sign up for the entire week or month. US Department of Labor Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act (EEOICPA)

The Millstadt Senior Center recently received communication from the Paducah Resource Center regarding compensation and medical benefits to workers who became ill as a result of working in the nuclear weapons industry. The EEOICPA has two parts, Part B and Part E. part B of the EEOICPA covers current and former workers who have been diagnosed with cancer, chronic beryllium disease, beryllium, or silica while working at a covered Atomic Weapons Employer (AWE) facility, during a specified time period. Individuals or their survivors found eligible under Part B may receive a lump sum compensation of \$150,000 and medical expenses for their covered condition.

Part E of the EEOICPA covers DOE contractor and subcontractor employees whose occupational exposure to a toxic substance at a covered DOE facility during a covered time period was a significant factor in causing, contributing to, or aggravating their claimed illness. Workers found eligible under Part E receive payment of their medical expenses for their covered illness and may also be eligible for impairment and/or wage loss compensation. Eligible survivors may receive a lump sum compensation payment of \$125,000 and may also receive additional compensation if the worker experienced wage loss due to the accepted condition.
