




I don't know anything about Thanksgiving, from how to shop





Medicare Minute Script – November 2018 Original Medicare and Medicare Advantage Providers

that physicians, medical equipment suppliers, and other Part B providers can have with Medicare. They are called participating provider, non- participating provider, and opt-out agreements.

To pay the least for services, see a Participating Provider when possible. Participating providers accept Medicare and always take assignment. Taking assignment means that the provider accepts Medicare's approved amount for health care services as full payment. The good news is, the vast majority of providers are participating providers. These providers are required to bill Medicare for care you receive. Medicare will process the bill and pay your provider directly for your care. If you see a participating provider, you are responsible for paying a 20% coinsurance for Medicare-covered services.

Non-participating providers accept Medicare but do not agree to take assignment in all cases. They may do so only on a case-bycase basis. Non-participating providers can charge up to 15% more than Medicare's approved amount for the cost of services you receive. This is known as the limiting charge. This means you could be responsible for up to 35% of Medicare's approved amount for covered services instead of 20%.

Opt-out providers do not accept Medicare at all and have signed an agreement to be excluded from the Medicare program. Medicare will not pay for care you receive from an opt-out provider except in emergencies. These providers can charge whatever they want for services, but they must follow certain rules to do so. An opt-out provider must give you a private contract describing their charges and confirming that you understand you are responsible for the full cost of your care and that Medicare will not reimburse you.

Point 2: Understand the kinds of providers in a Medicare Advantage Plan.

If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, your plan must cover the same health care services and items as Original Medicare, but can do so with different costs and restrictions. Each type of Medicare Advantage Plan has different network rules. A network is a group of doctors, hospitals, and medical facilities that contract with a plan to provide services. There are various ways a plan may manage your access to specialists or out-of-

network providers. For example, if you see a provider who is outside your plan's network, you may have to pay a higher copayment or coinsurance charge than you would for an innetwork provider. You could also be responsible for paying the full cost of your visit out-of-pocket, depending on what type of Medicare Advantage Plan you have. Remember that your costs are typically lowest when you use in-network providers and facilities, regardless of your plan. It is important to note that not all Medicare Advantage Plans work the same way. Make sure you understand a plan's network and coverage rules before enrolling. If you have questions, contact your plan for more information.

Point 3: Get your prescription drugs from the right kind of pharmacy.

Medicare Part D is Medicare's prescription drug benefit. Part D is offered through private companies either as a stand-alone plan for those enrolled in Original Medicare, or as a set of benefits included with your Medicare Advantage Plan. Part D plans generally have networks of pharmacies that they contract with to provide you with covered medications. Use a preferred, innetwork pharmacy to fill your prescriptions. Many pharmacy networks include both preferred and non-preferred pharmacies. You typically pay less for your prescriptions at preferred pharmacies. If you need to find a preferred, in-network pharmacy, or if you have any issues accessing your covered medications at the pharmacy, contact your Part D plan. Depending on how you get your Medicare coverage, you have different considerations when choosing health care providers. Today we will learn about the factors you should consider to get the coverage you need at the lowest cost.

Point 1: Know the different kinds of Original Medicare Providers. If you have Original Medicare and after you have met your deductible, your Part B costs can vary depending on the type of provider you see. There are three kinds of billing agreements

Take Action:

- 1.If you have Original Medicare, call 1-800-MEDICARE or visit <u>www.Medicare.gov</u> to find and compare providers who accept Medicare assignment.
- 2.If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, contact your plan to find in-network providers and to learn about your plan's rules and restrictions.
- 3.Contact your Part D plan to find preferred, in-network pharmacies where you can purchase plan- covered drugs.
- 4.Contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) for help choosing Medicare coverage, finding providers, and appealing service denials. Contact your Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) if you believe you have been the victim of Medicare fraud or attempted Medicare fraud.
- 5.Examples include a provider who refuses to bill Medicare and won't explain why, a provider who pressures you into signing a contract you don't understand, or misleading plan marketing.

Medicare Information Open enrollment for Medicare Part D runs from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7. SHIP specialist Patty Evansco will present "What's New with Medicare" in the Senior

Center on Wednesday, Oct. 24, from 1 to 3. This program will contain useful information for all Medicare beneficiaries, particularly those seniors new to Medicare. Advance registration is not required. Beginning on Tuesday, October 16 she will meet one on-one with individuals in the senior center regarding the Medicare Part D prescription drug program. Appointments are available between 9:00 am and 3:00 pm on Tuesdays in Millstadt and 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm on Thursdays at the Freeburg Township building for any Medicare beneficiary who has Medicare Part A or Part B or both. November is the time to get the help you need to choose or change your prescription drug plan. It is strongly recommended that you review your plan annually as plan coverage and drug costs often change for the coming year. In order to attend these Tuesday and Thursday sessions, you must schedule an appointment by calling Millstadt at (618) 476-3731 or Freeburg Township at (618) 539-5639.



LIHEAP HEATING 2019 The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

started on October 1st this year. Households that meet income eligibility will receive a onetime grant assistance paid directly to the utility companies. An applicant can only apply once in a program year. To be eligible the following documents must be provided:

- Social Security cards for all household members
- Total Income for last 30 days for entire household (SSA, SSI, Wages, Pension, etc.)
- Medicaid card Letter of Support and/or Letter of Permission (if applicable)
- Drivers License
- Current Utility bills (Nicor and Commonwealth Edison)
- Current Lease or Rent Receipt

Contact Millstadt Senior Center (618) 476-3731 for an appointment or for further questions. This program will end May 31, 2019 or until funds are depleted.

Millstadt Police Report

On October 6, the Millstadt Police Department took several vehicle burglary reports and one burglary to a garage report in the Alpine Meadows, Alpine Trails and Regency Place neighborhoods. The suspects entered unlocked vehicles. Three persons of interest have been identified. One individual has been charged. On Oct. 12, the St. Clair County Attorney Office Charged Cody J. Sale age 18 of Belleville with; burglary, entering a motor vehicle and unlawful use of credit card from the burglary, used at a gas station in Belleville. His bond was set at \$50,000.



Farmer's Almanac Makes Winter 2019 Predictions For Illinois


ILLINOIS — The Old Farmer's Almanac, founded in 1792, claims an 80 percent accuracy rate — and if you believe that, you might be optimistic about the winter ahead. Recently released predictions show a warmer-thanaverage winter for Illinois and much of the Midwest, as well as most of the country. This should make local Millstadt folks very pleased.

The 2019 winter weather forecast predicted "warm, wet" conditions for Illinois and the surrounding states.

"This winter, we expect to see above-normal temperatures almost everywhere in the United States, except in the Southwest, where we're predicting a colder-than-normal season," the almanac said. "Our milder-than-normal forecast is due to a decrease in solar activity and the expected arrival of a weak El Niño, which will prevent cold air masses from lingering in the North."

The predictions also call for more rain and less snow, with above-normal rainfall and below-average snowfall for Illinois.

While it could be a mild winter for the Midwest, our neighbors to the north in Canada will see a "mostly cold" winter with more snow, the almanac says.

What is MIPPA?

The Medicare Improvements for Patients and Providers Act (MIPPA) of 2008 is a multi-faceted piece of legislation related to Medicare. One important provision of MIPPA was the allocation of federal funding (through Section 119) for <u>State Health</u> <u>Insurance Assistance Programs</u> (SHIPs), Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs), and Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs) to help low-income Medicare beneficiaries apply for programs that make Medicare affordable. In addition to SHIPs, AAAs, and ADRCs, Tribes can also receive small grants to do MIPPA outreach in their communities.

MIPPA grants are administered by the U.S. Administration for Community Living (ACL).

Medicare Benefits & MIPPA

MIPPA grantees specifically help low-income seniors and persons with disabilities to apply for two programs that help pay for their <u>Medicare costs</u>:

- •The <u>Medicare Part D Extra Help/Low-Income</u> <u>Subsidy</u> (LIS/Extra Help), which helps pay for the Part D premium and reduces the cost of prescriptions at the pharmacy, and
- The <u>Medicare Savings Programs</u> (MSPs), which help pay for Medicare Part B.

MIPPA grantees also provide Part D counseling to Medicare beneficiaries who live in rural areas, and are tasked to promote Medicare's <u>prevention and</u> <u>wellness benefits.</u>

Through MIPPA, SHIP and SHAP Grants Millstadt Township Senior Services has applied for and received \$60,701 in funding toward helping those in our community with Medicare assistance as well as finding sources for those that need help with Medicare assistance.
