Open enrollment for Medicare Part D runs from Oct. 16 to Dec. 7. SHIP specialist Patty Evansco will present "What's New



with Medicare" in the Senior Center on Thursday, Oct. 12, from 1 to 3. This program will contain useful information for all Medicare beneficiaries, particularly those seniors new to Medicare. Advance registration is not required.

Beginning on Tuesday, October 17, she will meet one -on-one with individuals in the senior center regarding the Medicare Part D prescription drug program. Appointments are available between 1:00 pm and 3:00 pm on Tuesdays in Millstadt and 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm on Thursdays at the Freeburg Township building for any Medicare beneficiary who has Medicare Part A or Part B or both. November is the time to get the help you need to choose or change your prescription drug plan. It is strongly recommended that you review your plan annually as plan coverage and drug costs often change for the coming year. In order to attend these Tuesday and Thursday sessions, you must schedule appointment by calling Millstadt at (618) 476-3731 or Freeburg Township at (618) 539-5545.






How is a Corn Maze Made?

In the spring, the corn is planted in the field in a grid pattern. The entire field is planted with corn. When the corn is about 6" tall, the maze pattern is mowed out. Where the maze pattern has been mowed, a weed killer is sprayed to keep the corn and weeds from growing the rest of the season.



Later in the fall when everyone has made it out of the maze successfully, the corn is harvested, usually for animal feed, and the field is tilled under until the next spring.

Commodity OOQUANK Food Program St. Louis Area Foodbank supplemental food source for seniors age 60 and older who fall within 130% of the

federal poverty guidelines—seniors may participate in this program while also receiving food assistance via food pantries, meals on wheels, and/or SNAP (food stamps). The Foodbank partners with an organization that elects to administer the CSFP boxes to qualified seniors. Millstadt Township Senior Services would receive a once a month free delivery of free boxes to be distributed to the seniors signed up for the program; each box contains about 16 shelf stable items, plus cheese. The program does require some administrative work including, application sign up and verification of seniors, maintenance of sign-in sheets, and re-certification of participants that may be conducted verbally every 6 months.

Have You had a Shingles Shot?

2/3's of us over 65 have not had a shingles shot.

We're good about getting flu shots, but still nearly one in three between the ages of 65-74 skipped the shot last flu season. But, the shingles shot is the most neglected inoculation. This shot reduces the risk of getting a viral disease that can cause skin to become painful and blistered, plus fever, headache, fatigue and sensitivity to light.

The vaccine is recommended for adults 60 and older. This includes anyone who has already had shingles. Most insurance policies will cover the shot.

Keep your sleeve rolled-up, while you're at the doctor's office, have them check your vaccination record. If you have not had a tetanus shot in the past 10 years, you are due to have one of them.

Reduce your risk of illness and complications that can be prevented by vaccines check your immunization record with your doctor on your next visit.

Many people think falls are a normal part of aging. The truth is, they're not. Most falls can be prevented—and you have the power to reduce your risk.

Exercising, managing your medications, having your vision checked, and making your living environment safer are all steps you can take to prevent a fall.

Every year on the first day of fall, we celebrate National Falls Prevention Awareness Day to bring attention to this growing public health issue. To promote greater awareness and understanding here are 10 common myths—and the reality—about older adult falls:

Myth 1: Falling happens to other people, not to me.

Reality: Many people think, "It won't happen to me." But the truth is that 1 in 3 older adults—about 12 million—fall every year in the U.S.

Myth 2: Falling is something normal that happens as you get older.

Reality: Falling is not a normal part of aging. Strength and balance exercises, managing your medications, having your vision checked and making your living environment safer are all steps you can take to prevent a fall.

Myth 3: If I limit my activity, I won't fall.

Reality: Some people believe that the best way to prevent falls is to stay at home and limit activity. Not true. Performing physical activities will actually help you stay independent, as your strength and range of motion benefit from remaining active. Social activities are also good for your overall health.

Myth 4: As long as I stay at home, I can avoid falling.

Reality: Over half of all falls take place at home. Inspect your home for fall risks. Fix simple but serious hazards such as clutter, throw rugs, and poor lighting. Make simple home modifications, such as adding grab bars in the bathroom, a second handrail on stairs, and non-slip paint on outdoor steps.

Myth 5: Muscle strength and flexibility can't be regained.

Reality: While we do lose muscle as we age, exercise can partially restore strength and flexibility. It's never too late to start an exercise program. Even if you've been a "couch potato" your whole life, becoming active now will benefit you in many ways—including protection from falls.

Myth 6: Taking medication doesn't increase my risk of falling.

Reality: Taking any medication may increase your risk of fa lling. Medications affect people in many different ways and can sometimes make you dizzy or sleepy. Be careful when starting a new medication. Talk to your health care provider about potential side effects or interactions of your medications.

Myth 7: I don't need to get my vision checked every year.

Reality: Vision is another key risk factor for falls. Aging is associated with some forms of vision loss that increase risk of falling and injury. People with vision problems are more than twice as likely to fall as those without visual impairment. Have your eyes checked at least once a year and update your eyeglasses. For those with low vision there are programs and assistive devices that can help. Ask your optometrist for a referral.

Myth 8: Using a walker or cane will make me more dependent.

Reality: Walking aids are very important in helping many older adults maintain or improve their mobility. However, make sure you use these devices safely. Have a physical therapist fit the walker or cane to you and instruct you in its safe use.

Myth 9: I don't need to talk to family members or my health care provider if I'm concerned about my risk of falling. I don't want to alarm them, and I want to keep my independence.

Reality: Fall prevention is a team effort. Bring it up with your doctor, family, and anyone else who is in a position to help. They want to help you maintain your mobility and reduce your risk of falling.

Myth 10: I don't need to talk to my parent, spouse, or other older adult if I'm concerned

about their risk of falling. It will hurt their feelings, and it's none of my business.

Reality: Let them know about your concerns and offer support to help them maintain the highest degree of independence possible. There are many things you can do, incl uding removing hazards in the home, finding a fall prevention program in the community, or setting up a vision exam.

SHIP Corner

Millstadt Township Senior Center SENIOR HE. is a sponsoring agency for Senior Health Insurance Program help

and we recently received our 2018 updated Manual. During the coming months I will be sharing with you some information that I feel is important and informational.

Organization and Administration of the SHIP Program: SHIP was initiated in July of 1988 by the Illinois Department of Insurance in response to the needs of Illinois' senior citizens regarding their health insurance. In April of 2013, under Executive Order by the Governor, SHIP was transferred to the Illinois Department on Aging.

The organizational structure of SHIP consists of:

- The Illinois Department on Aging, which provides initial training, continuing education and ongoing support of SHIP counselors:
- The sponsoring organization (Millstadt Township Senior Services), which provides coordinators, office space and office support services;
- The coordinator (Patty Evansco), who is responsible for the administrative aspects of the SHIP program, which include publicizing SHIP services, recruiting scheduling counseling sessions volunteers, responding to counselors' needs; and
- Counselor Patty Evansco meets with clients individually to provide objective information about health insurance, advocacy assistance, or referral if appropriate.

The state is divided geographically into four separate SHIP regions: Cook County, Northern Illinois, Central Illinois and Southern Illinois. Within each region, counselors are organized in to units that serve a specific geographic area, usually designated by counties.



Some of the you questions should think about are:
