Fuzzy died Friday, September 21, 2018 from cancer. He was 75.

He never missed a chance to work

at a Senior Center fundraiser including Bunco and the Annual BBQ as well as distributing the monthly Senior Talk Newsletter and overseeing the weekly Corn Hole game.

Even in declining health, Fuzzy was dedicated to the center. He really cared for the program and was there to back and support us and helped us grow. He was extremely proud of the growth and achievements of the center; especially when we received the grant for the new bus and van.

Fuzzy was well liked and took pleasure in spending time at the Senior Center and meeting new people and playing cards with the guys upstairs on Tuesdays. Everybody loved him.

He knew everybody and everyone knew him.

He was always kind and complimentary especially to our summer high school volunteers. It was important to him that we recognize them for spending their summers working at the Senior Center.

Fuzzy's death is a huge loss to Millstadt.




Eighteenth Annual Bunco Night Brings Eight Year Total To \$18,047

Most Common Ways Your Pet May Alert You of Danger

If your pet is behaving erratically, it could be due to a medical issue... or it could be that he is trying to tell you something. The Associated Press-Petside.com poll revealed the most common ways that pets convey their concerns to their owners. If you notice any of these (or a combination), don't shrug it off until you've explored what your pet might be saying:

- Your pet may hide in a safe place
- Your pet may whine or cry
- Your pet may become hyperactive, erratic, or make unpredictable movements
- Your pet may bark or meow persistently

Even stray animals have been reported to save humans, although, most often, the heroic acts take place among a dog or cat and his closely bonded owner. If you're thinking of expanding your family to include a rescue dog or cat, you never know, he may very well end up saving your life, just as you've saved his.



Congregate Meals Down, Meals on Wheels Up

September 30, 2018 ended the Millstadt Township Senior Services fiscal year. Last year we served 8,427 meals in our dining room, down from 9,420 congregate meals last year. While our Home Delivered Meals numbers are rising our dining room numbers are declining. Our goal for the upcoming year is to bring our average back up to 41 meals per day and hope you can help by inviting your friends or neighbors to join us for lunch. St. James Over 50 group joins us at least twice a week and sometimes even more. We are looking for more groups to help us increase our numbers. This decline leaves us unable to collect nearly \$7,000 in grant money for our program.

We delivered 11,772 meals last year, a number that has steadily grew from 7,731 in 2008. This indicates that more homebound seniors are being more aware our program.

Last year we averaged 34 diners per day at the Senior Center and 47 Meals on Wheels per day.

Hang Up On Medicare Card Scams

Scammers follow the news – and the money. A few months ago, we shared the news that Medicare is sending new cards to everyone who gets Medicare benefits, replacing your Social Security number with another number. As expected, scammers have been trying to cash in on this change.

These scammers typically reach out by phone and have tried a few different tactics. Sometimes, they claim to be a Medicare representative and ask to verify (ahem, steal) your information. Or they claim that there's a fee for your new card (there isn't). Others claim that your Medicare card was compromised and you need to move your money from your bank into "safer accounts" (it wasn't, you don't, and following their advice means putting your money in their pockets). We've even heard of some scammers offering plastic versions of the card for a fee – even though the real Medicare cards are paper and there are no legitimate plastic cards.

How can you avoid these scams? Remember these tips:

• Don't give personal information to get your new Medicare card. If someone calls claiming to be from Medicare, asking for your Social Security number, bank information, or other information to get your new card, that's a scam. Hang up. Medicare will never ask you to give personal information to get your new Medicare number and card.

• **Don't pay for your new card.** It's yours for free. If anyone calls and says you need to pay for it, that's a scam. Hang up.

If you've already given out your bank account information over the phone, talk to your bank immediately. You'll want to deal with any unauthorized activity on your account as soon as possible.

A Safe Bet

Lottery and sweepstakes scams can set you up for a loselose situation. Many of these scams are typically run outside the United States using technology to disguise their phone number or make it look like a local number. Remember, the government and law enforcement never call to notify lottery and sweepstakes winners or award prizes of any kind.

If you believe you are a victim of a scam, you might be able to stop or reverse funds if you act quickly.

Report the scam to:

-Your financial institution and money transfer service used in the potential scam.

-The FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3.gov) -Local Police 476-7250.

-The Federal Trade Commission (ftc.gov/complaint).

Better yet, if it's sounds too good to be true, don't give out any personal information. It's most likely a scam. Just hang -up the phone.

Lucky Saves A Senior

It's not unusual for people to say that their dog rescued them, instead of the other way around. One evening as one of our Meals on Wheels clients was getting ready for bed "Lucky" kept acting "strangely" and acting like he was wanting to tell his owner something. Finally our client walked into the kitchen to see what he wanted to show her and realized she had left the stove on. Lucky was trying to alert his owner that she was in potential danger. Most dog owners believe their dog has a sixth sense and she is grateful that Lucky saved her. Please before you go to bed at night, develop a routine of checking stoves and other appliances to be sure they are turned off.





Medicare Information Open enrollment for Medicare Part D runs from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7. SHIP specialist Patty Evansco will present "What's New with Medicare" in the Senior

Center on Wednesday, Oct. 24, from 1 to 3. This program will contain useful information for all Medicare beneficiaries, particularly those seniors new to Medicare. Advance registration is not required. Beginning on Tuesday, October 16 she will meet one on-one with individuals in the senior center regarding the Medicare Part D prescription drug program. Appointments are available between 9:00 am and 3:00 pm on Tuesdays in Millstadt and 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm on Thursdays at the Freeburg Township building for any Medicare beneficiary who has Medicare Part A or Part B or both. November is the time to get the help you need to choose or change your prescription drug plan. It is strongly recommended that you review your plan annually as plan coverage and drug costs often change for the coming year. In order to attend these Tuesday and Thursday sessions, you must schedule an appointment by calling Millstadt at (618) 476-3731 or Freeburg Township at (618) 539-5639.



LIHEAP HEATING 2019 The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

started on October 1st this year. Households that meet income eligibility will receive a onetime grant assistance paid directly to the utility companies. An applicant can only apply once in a program year. To be eligible the following documents must be provided:

Social Security cards for all household members

- Total Income for last 30 days for entire household (SSA, SSI, Wages, Pension, etc.)
- Medicaid card Letter of Support and/or Letter of Permission (if applicable)
- Drivers License
- Current Utility bills (Nicor and Commonwealth Edison)
- Current Lease or Rent Receipt

Contact Millstadt Senior Center (618) 476-3731 for an appointment or for further questions. This program will end May 31, 2019 or until funds are depleted.




DID YOU SIGN IN?


Linda was a member of Trinity Lutheran Church in Millstadt, IL. She was previously employed by Proctor and Gamble as a sales
