



What Is That Beautiful Shrub Called?



Many people have asked me this

question, and today I saw our Master Gardener Marty Gibson out with the flowers and decided to stop and chat about this shrub.

Marty told me it was a Limelight Hydrangea. The Limelight hydrangea has a pleasing, mounded shape, but it is the blooms that attract attention. In northern climates, the shrub flowers from late summer through late fall. This unique panicle hydrangea revolutionized landscaping across North America. Huge, football-shaped flowers open in an elegant celadon green that looks fresh and clean in summer's heat. The blooms age to an array of pink, red, and burgundy which persists through frost for months of irresistible flowers. You can use 'Limelight' hydrangea about any way you can imagine as a showy flowering hedge, to screen off air conditioners, as an attentiongetting specimen, in containers, flower gardens, or anywhere around your home. A long-time favorite of professional florists, it also makes an excellent cut flower, fresh or dried.

2022 SOCIAL SECURITY CHANGES

Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA):

Based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI-W) from the third quarter of 2020 through the third quarter of 2021, Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) beneficiaries will receive a 5.9 percent COLA for 2022. Other important 2022 Social Security information is as follows:

NOTE: The 7.65% tax rate is the combined rate for Social Security and Medicare. The Social Security portion (OASDI) is 6.20% on earnings up to the applicable taxable maximum amount (see below). December – Healthy Holiday Habits

The holidays are in full swing and that means lots of food and sweet treat temptations everywhere you look. Not to worry, you can still enjoy the holiday season without overdoing it!

Stick to Your Normal Routines and Do Not Skip Meals

 Skipping meals to "save up" for one or two large holiday meals is not the best strategy – stick to your usual eating habits and routines - your body will thank you.

Balance Your Plate During the Holiday Season – Holiday Meals are Often Very High in Carbohydrates

- Carbohydrates are not "bad" for you, but it is easy to eat more than your body needs.
- Choose better sources of carbohydrates that are high in fiber or take longer to digest (e.g. whole grains, beans, vegetables, most fruits, etc.) and make sure to include lean sources of protein.
- Makeover your traditional holiday meals with a few ingredient/food swaps or modifications.

Practice Portion Control

- Pick your favorite dessert and sides and have smaller portions of them than you normally would
- Avoid trying "a little of everything" as this often leaves you feeling miserable and is not good for your blood sugars.

Fill up on Fiber from Fruits, Vegetables, and Whole Grains

- Look for products with at least 2.5gm of fiber/serving on the food label and aim for 25-30gm/day.
- A "Good Source" of fiber has 2.5gm-4gm of fiber/serving.
- An "Excellent Source" of fiber has 5gm of fiber or more/serving.
- Remember to start slowly when adding more fiber into your diet as well as increasing your fluid intake to help prevent constipation/ diarrhea.

Do Not Forget to Exercise

- Physical activities like walking, dancing, yoga, biking, or tai chi can help support both mental and emotional health by:
 - Improving your sleep
 - Reducing feelings of stress and depression
 - Increasing your energy level
 - Improving your overall emotional well-being and mood





BIBLE TALK

The Spirit Of Christmas

We see signs of the Christmas season all around us. From the beautiful colored lights decorating the homes in our neighborhoods to the festive music in the stores. From the holiday family specials on TV to the gifts and people overflowing from the stores. From the smell of freshly baked cookies to the excited and happy faces of children. This is truly a joyous time of year for many people, a time of anticipation and excitement. A time when the normal daily routine of life is replaced by activities at church, at home, with family and friends. A time of fond memories of past Christmases, and hopes and dreams for future Christmases. Just feel the joy and excitement that are in the air.

Yet for others, the Christmas season is an anxious time filled with hectic plans and preparations. A time when they are driven to make sure every detail is properly taken care of. Details such as a neat and clean home, the decorations and tree beautifully displayed, the cards thoughtfully chosen and gifts carefully wrapped, and the table and meals well prepared. For them, Christmas is an exhausting time of a myriad of details to be done. Just feel the anxiety and exhaustion that are in the air.

And yet for others, the Christmas season isn't a time of joy and excitement. Instead it is a time sorrow and tears. It is a time when remembering the joys of the past, brings pain to the present, because life has taken unexpected turns. Turns and bends that seem to go on and on with no hope of being straightened, either now or in the future. A time of loneliness and brokeness. A time when the busyness of life is interrupted, and emotions and feelings refuse to stay in the well kept boxes of our lives. Just feel the sorrow and loneliness that are in the air.

Christmas is also a time when we gather in churches, remembering how Jesus Christ was born some 2000 years ago. We remember the angel Gabriel's announcement to the virgin Mary, of the struggles Joseph went through as he found out Mary was with child, of the long journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem only to be turned away from the inn, of the shepherds in the fields at night who were frightened by the chorus of angels, of the Wisemen from the far East who had come a long way to worship the new born King, of Herod's jealous anger which doomed the male infants 2 years of age and younger and of the hurried escape to the foreign land of Egypt. Here we have a fourth slice of the spirit of Christmas, that many of us feel, a spirit of remembrance.

So what does it mean for us here today? Which of these slices is really the spirit of Christmas, or is there something else?

Let us turn to God's own Word and hear the message He has for us. Matthew 1:22-23, "All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: (Isaiah 7:14) 'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,' which means, 'God is with us."" The Son of God in heaven above came down to earth to become one of us and one with us. Or as John writes in 1:14, "And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth."

The Spirit of Christmas is God coming to earth. Coming to participate in our life, to share in our joys and struggles, and ultimately to save us from our sins. Just as Matthew wrote in the two verses preceding the Emmanuel passage, Matthew 1:20-21, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

The spirits of excitement, exhaustion, sorrow and even remembrance seem so mundane and beneath the glory, honor and dignity of Jesus Christ whom we celebrate at Christmas. Yet we must remember that Jesus came to be "God with us." To fully share in our human life on earth, not as an unfeeling spirit but as a flesh and blood human. So the writer of Hebrews gives us hope by drawing attention to the real humanity of Jesus, in 4:14-16, "Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need."

Through Jesus Christ, God is with us here now and today. Therefore we can bring all of our thoughts and feelings to him. For He knows what we are going through and He cares for us, even as Peter tells us in <u>1 Peter 5:7</u>, "Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you." The Spirit of Christmas is not merely the remembrance of what happened in a stable some 2000 years ago. It is the vibrant life we can share with the God who is with us, because God himself entered our life and redeems us through the Christ.

In closing I realize that each one of us experiences different thoughts and feelings at Christmas, but I want you to focus on the true Spirit of Christmas, that is on Jesus Christ who is God with us. Matthew 28:20, says, "remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age," and Hebrews 13:5, says, "I will never leave you or forsake you."

So, may you walk in the Spirit of Christ throughout this Christmas season and beyond. And, may you share the refreshing spirit of Christ with a family member, a friend, and an acquaintance who is overcome by a spirit of exhaustion or a spirit of sorrow. Amen, and the people of Jesus Christ say, Amen! Blessings, *Pastor Darrell Weber*

Sweet & Sour Red Beets

A simple recipe with just a few ingredients, these tangy beets have a rich, shiny sauce.

¾ cup granulated sugar

1/3 cup apple cider vinegar

4 tsp. cornstarch

2 15 oz. cans sliced beets

3 Tbsp. butter

¼ tsp. salt


¼ tsp. black pepper

Whisk together sugar, vinegar, cornstarch and 1/3 beet liquid (or water) in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat to medium-low, and cook, whisking occasionally, about 5 minutes. Gently stir beets into sugar-vinegar mixture. Reduce heat to low and simmer about 30 minutes, gently stirring occasionally. Stir in butter, salt and pepper until the butter melts. Remove from heat. Serve beets warm or chilled. Serves 6.

They are now waiting on Ameren to replace their poles which will hopefully be completed the following week. ANNEXATIONS: Mayor Todd stated he and Adam Romero have met with property owners south of the Village. PARKS, POOL AND RECREATION: Mayor Todd stated two new trees have been ordered for Liederkranz Park and three trees for other places within the Village. He added a tree was lost each on Diamond 2 and Diamond 3. Scott Baltz stated he talked with someone interested in putting a memorial tree by Diamond 2. Mayor Todd also stated Scott is waiting to hear back on when the new pickleball lines can be added to the tennis courts. CEMETERY: Ray Famula stated they are still waiting on the new cemetery signs. Scott Baltz stated he talked with the sign company and there may be some delays. COMMUNITY CENTER: Ray Famula stated the Senior Center will be helping with the Covid booster shots. Mike French asked if it would be done as it was in the past, with them helping to make appointments to receive the shot in Belleville. Ray answered yes. Ray stated the Sandra M. Bereitschaft Meals on Wheels Trivia Night was a success. The Center's fiscal year end was at the end of September and all reports have been filed with AgeSmart. The Illinois Attorney General will be hosting a fraud workshop. Total meals served increased 70% from 2019. The Center has plans to remodel and upgrade their restrooms in the near future. PLANNING COMMISSION & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: Mike French stated the next Planning Commission meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 16th . They will be looking at long term planning. PUBLIC SAFETY: Emergency Service and Disaster Agency - Scott Baltz stated that both sirens sounded like they were working during the previous night's storms. OLD BUSINESS: Otto Faulbaum from Millstadt Sister Cities stated the Sister Cities wanted to be part of the new entrance signs. He has been working with Lager Monument Company and has a final version of what they would like included. He talked with Mike French and the limestone panel will be the same as the Village's but on a smaller scale. When Germann Brick creates the base, their panel would be set in and will look integrated. The Sister Cities will pay for their panel and for any extra brickwork that may be needed. Rick Wegner from Millstadt Sister cities presented a check to the Village. The money comes from their two fundraisers, one being their booth at the St. Charles Oktoberfest in St. Charles, Missouri. Mayor Todd stated the lining of the Parkview storm sewer has been completed. The Village was awarded another grant from St. Clair County for the project and the bulldozer has already been brought out to the field. Mayor Todd stated the Village will apply for the DCEO grant in January. It costs \$5,000 to apply. If this grant is received, the streetscape project on Washington Street will include the first block of East Washington Street and the third block of West Washington Street. If the Village is awarded the ITEP grant this fall, the streetscape project will continue two blocks to the west on West Washington Street. Mayor Todd stated Building Commissioner Adam Romero had looked over the contract from the Friends of the Old Water Tower and he will meet with them to discuss some language that is needed in contract. NEW BUSINESS: Rick Wegner with Millstadt Sister Cities stated the Illinois Sister Cities Association honored Millstadt with its 2020 Champion of Youth award. It is an honor to be acknowledged by the State. He thanked Ray and Trudy Famula for accepting the award at the IML conference and presented a check to the Village. Mayor Todd stated the Biathlon made \$11,256.97 this year. The money will be used for a scoreboard on Diamond 3. All the diamonds on Kalbfleisch will now have fences and scoreboards. He thanked everyone that helped make the event a success

He has tried talking with the providers but has not received any answers. He wondered if possibly having a generator at the new water tower could help. A lot of people and businesses are reliant on the internet, and it is critical to have. Mayor Todd stated the Village does not have many options; the Village has reached out to other providers but unfortunately has not received a lot of feedback.
