History From John Kalbfleish

1836—Kathrina Maria Eckert was born August 9, 1836, to Johan Nicolaus Eckert and Mara Elizabeth Eckert (nee Gerrmann). Her parents had come from Germany and became United States citizens. Kathrina's father, a shoemaker, acquired a home on First Street in St. Louis, MO. (First Street being the first street up from the bank of the Mississippi River). Other children born to Nicolaus and Marie Eckert were Elizabeth, (later married to John Kalbfleisch), and Charles. While Kathrina was still young her father acquired a tract of land near Millstadt and brought his family there. When the Mexican War broke out her father joined the U.S. Army. Kathrina endured with her mother the fears and hardships of lonesomeness in a new country until her father returned.

November 4, 1910 - Louis Schuff Jr. has fixed up the old Kalbfleisch-Smith auto, which was the first machine in Millstadt and which has been out of service several years.

February 14, 1902 - People were crossing the river at St Louis on the ice the first of the week.

June 10, 1893 - Mr. Glenn R. Smith and Miss Amanda Kalbfleisch, both of Millstadt were married in St. Louis on Wednesday, June 10, 1893. Mr. Smith is a popular and enterprising young electrician of Millstadt. He is a graduate of the Collier Engineering College of Schranton, Pa., and is a member of the International Engineering Association and the Erecting Engineers' Association. In a recent examination before the St Louis board of examiners Mr. Smith was one of two out of 15 applicants who passed the examination, making the exceptionally high grade of 98 percent.

Mr. Smith is the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Smith of Freeburg township. Mrs. Smith is a pretty and popular young lady of 22 summers. Both Mr. and Mrs. Smith have many friends and relatives who will wish them a long and happy life.

I have many great memories, and I know you remember Dave from his unique style of calling Quilt Bingo at St. James. When he died, we had been married thirty-seven years. Up until that time, I had never taken out the trash, mowed

the grass, planted or weeded any of the beautiful flowers he had in our yard, shoveled snow, washed the car, changed a furnace filter, put up an outside Christmas decoration, painted anything, had the oil changed and other jobs that I eventually learned to do or had someone help me. You do not realize how much you appreciate someone until they are gone. Please show your appreciation to those close to you before it is too late.

The Millstadt Senior Center was organized and opened in 1983 by Charlotte Mehrtens. This program was made possible then and still is today through the support of Millstadt Township and the Village of Millstadt. The local government support, fundraisers, and donations along with Federal and State funding from the Department of Aging are the means for success of this program.

The cost is to prepare, package and deliver each meal is \$11. We ask for a **suggested contribution** of \$4.50 to offset this cost. The difference is made up from grants, local government, donations, and fundraisers. Before COVID this was working out well and allowing us to stay solvent. The suggested monthly cost for a meal every day is \$90. There are many clients that need this \$90 to buy medicine or pay their utility bills. We have seniors that receive supplemental income from their children, but since COVID many of them have lost their jobs and are unable to help as before. If a client is unable to pay the suggested contribution, we would not discontinue meals. This service is an entitlement our seniors have earned.

September is National Senior Center Month and I realize there are many businesses and organizations in town that are asking for your donations, but please consider helping to feed a Senior this month.

What To Know About Contact Tracing

If you've been in close contact with someone who tested positive for

COVID-19, you may be contacted by a contact tracer or public health

worker from your state or local health department in an effort to help

slow the spread of the disease. Here's what to know if you get a call:

A contact tracer may call to let you know you may have been exposed

to someone with COVID-19. All information you share with a contact

tracer, like who you've been in contact with and your recent

whereabouts, is confidential.

You may be asked to self-quarantine for 14 days. This means staying

home, monitoring your health, and maintaining social distance from

others at all times.

You may be asked to monitor your health and watch for symptoms of

COVID-19 [2]. Notify your doctor if you develop symptoms, and seek

medical care if your symptoms worsen or become severe.

Contact Tracing Scammers

Be aware of scammers pretending to be COVID-19 contact tracers [4].

Legitimate contact tracers will never ask for your Medicare Number or

financial information. If someone calls and asks for personal

information, like your Medicare Number, hang up and report it to us at 1-800-MEDICARE.

Each day you will receive 12 BINGO numbers that have been drawn at the Senior Center. Match the numbers to the numbers




on your card daily. When you have coverall, give the card to your Meals on Wheels driver and the next day your gift will arrive and everyone else will receive a new card to start over with.

Following are two suggestions:

A trip to the eastern part of Illinois will bring you to the home of the white squirrel, Olney.

Olney, on Route 50, boasts a large population of white albino Eastern gray squirrels, which have all-white fur and bright blue eyes. Throughout the city, you will see images of the white squirrel on street signs, murals and statues. Olney has passed laws to keep the squirrels safe, a necessity, since its population has decreased by about 80% in the last 70 years. As a result, white squirrels have the right of way on public streets, and there's a \$750.00 fine for anyone who runs over one. Drive with care!

A trip closer to home will start on Route 3 heading south to Route 155. You will be near the Fort de Chartres area, a good place for a picnic lunch. A short drive from Prairie du Rocher is the St. Genevieve-Modoc Ferry. The ferry operates most days if the Mississippi is not too high. The ferry connects the Modoc area with St. Genevieve, Missouri. You can watch the ferry crossing or take your car across, \$15.00 one way or \$25.00 round-trip cash or checks only. This fall, the ferry will be providing crossing services for combines, tractors, trucks, bicycles and motorcycles. Best of all watching the ferry crossing is free.

Masks That Give Back

In early 2020, Bonrisu's founder, Herbert Yu, found himself with a few precious N95 masks. Looking down at this important and scarce commodity, he couldn't help but think of all the people that needed these- healthcare professionals, essential workers, elderly, and those at risk. When he was contacted by a friend to help her New York hospital find much needed personal protective equipment, he began leveraging his sourcing experience and reached out all around the world to figure out a way to help.

After a painstaking couple of weeks dealing with shipping, logistics, customs, and federal regulatory agencies to learn about the evolving PPE guidelines, he successfully sourced thousands of masks. He also realized there must be a better way to meet the massive need unfolding.

At the same time, the business world was radically changing. Work travel ceased and work from home became the norm. Business attire got pushed to the back of the closet. This had a devastating impact on Herbert's fellow entrepreneur and beloved tailor as he saw demand plummet for his custom suits and shirts.

And that's when Bonrisu was born. In order to fund large mask donations, our Founder re-imagined his tailor's business by producing high-quality, thoughtfully crafted face masks—made from the same premium men's dress shirts Herbert used to wear.

Built on the idea that both employment opportunities can be created and the community can be supported, Bonrisu has been able to help retain 30+ hard-working employees in the tailor shop and donate thousands of masks to atrisk, elderly communities in the US and Canada.

Bonrisu has donated 35 masks and plans to donate more to Millstadt Township Senior Services.



AgeSmart also donated Wellness Packages to be distributed to seniors that include jersey knit masks with the AgeSmart logo on them, forehead thermometers, gloves and hand sanitizers.

The solution is heated before it leaves the nozzle but produces a safe fog to pilot lights do not have be extinguished.



Illinois Secretary Of State News

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White on Tuesday announced that the expiration date for valid driver's licenses held by Illinois drivers who are 75 years of age or older has been extended for a period of one year past the licenses' current 2020 expiration date.


As a result, drivers age 75 and older with a 2020 driver's license expiration date do not need to visit a facility to renew their driver's license until shortly before their birthday in 2021.

Letters are being sent to drivers that qualify for this extension. The letter should be kept with the qualifying driver as further proof of the one-year extension. In addition, driving records on the Secretary of State's computer system have been updated to show the new 2021 expiration dates for qualified drivers, and law enforcement agencies both state and nationwide have been notified of the extended expiration dates.

White is reminding all other drivers that expiration dates for driver's licenses/ID cards and license plate stickers have been extended until Nov. 1, 2020. As a result, expired documents will remain valid until Nov. 1 so customers under age 75 do not need to rush into Driver Services facilities, especially during hot weather.

VILLAGE OF MILLSTADT

JULY 13, 2020 7:00 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by Mike Todd, with the following trustees answering to roll call: Randy Burk, Mike Capell, Ray Famula, Mike French, Al Lehr, and Mark Todd. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. A motion was made by Ray Famula to approve the June 23rd minutes. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

COMMUNICATIONS OR CORRESPONDENCE: none. COMMITTEE ON ACCOUNTS: Mike Capell stated he reviewed the bills. Mike Capell made a motion to pay the bills. Mike French seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. PERSONNEL: none. PUBLIC WORKS: SEWER: Al Lehr stated he talked with Brian. A bearing went out on a motor in the digestor pump. Brian already replaced it. WATER: Al Lehr stated the maintenance department had to pump water two weeks earlier due to rain. Mayor Todd stated the water tower and the ground tank were inspected. The results should be back in three to four weeks. REFUSE: none. MOSQUITO CONTROL: none.

STREETS, ALLEYS AND SIDEWALKS: Randy Burk stated he and Scott Baltz organized the streetscape documents and are ready to get the easements for the project. Mayor Todd asked if there was a deadline. Randy answered the project is still ahead of schedule. He has also been looking at some drainage issues in town. Randy met with Dana from TWM about the work on the last block of West Laurel Street. Mayor Todd stated they would not be putting in sidewalk on the southside of the block. Randy added they will include curb and gutter but if it ends up costing too much then it will be taken out. The bids for the project will be due at the last St. Clair County meeting in August. 2.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS, MAINTENANCE, AND EQUIPMENT: Randy Burk opened the bids for the new utility truck for the maintenance department. There was only one bid from Mertz Ford for an F350. Scott Baltz looked over the bid to make sure the equipment requested was included. Randy Burk made a motion to accept the bid for an F350 from Mertz Ford for \$45,308. Mike French seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

CABLE SERVICES AND CELL TOWERS: Mark Todd stated the Everstream ROW Access Agreement between the Village and Everstream needed to be voted on. It is a 10 year agreement with up to two renewals for 5 years each. The fee schedule is in the back of the packet. Mayor Todd added the Village Attorney and TWM both looked at the agreement and saw no issues. Mark Todd made a motion to approve the Everstream ROW Access Agreement. Al Lehr seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS: Mike French stated Resolution 20-05 is for a grant from the Metro East Park and Recreation District for a scoreboard for Diamond 3. Mike French made a motion to accept Resolution 20-05 as presented. Al Lehr seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Mike French stated Ordinance 1121 is for case V-177 for Zion Church. They are requesting an exemption from landscaping ordinance 152.117. The Zoning Board recommended approval. Mike French made a motion to accept Ordinance 1121 as presented. Ray Famula seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Mike French stated Ordinance 1212 is for case V-179 for Lee Vogel. He is requesting a nine-foot rear setback variance and a two-foot side setback variance at 418 West Van Buren. The Zoning Board recommended approval. Mike French made a motion to accept Ordinance 1212 as presented. Randy Burk seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

ANNEXATIONS: Mayor Todd stated the property on Veterans Drive is waiting for the County to plat the property. Due to Covid-19, mapping and planning is behind. Once the property is platted, annexation can move forward.

PARKS, POOL AND RECREATION: Mark Todd stated there would be a Park Board meeting on Tuesday, July 14th at Tuffy Mueth Field at 7pm. Mayor Todd stated the fence is up on Diamond 2 and was used at the baseball tournament the previous weekend.

CEMETERY: Ray Famula stated there was a damaged tombstone that has been repaired.

COMMUNITY CENTER: Ray Famula stated the lowest bid for the elevator repairs was \$2,250. Ray Famula made a motion the Village pay \$1,125 pending approval from the Township. Al Lehr seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Ray added the company also offered a maintenance contract, which may be something to consider. Ray stated the Senior Center is going to start their porch sale. They also received a Capital Improvement Grant for \$2,500. The next Senior Center Board meeting will be on Tuesday, July 21st at 6pm.

PLANNING COMMISSION & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: Mike French stated the next Planning Commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, July 21st but is based on agenda.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Police Department - Crissy Pipik swore in new Police Officer Jacob Fowler.

OLD BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated State Representative Greenwood dropped off masks at Village Hall. Some of the masks were taken to the Senior Center.

Mayor Todd stated he and Mike Capell will be meeting on Wednesday, July 15th to review the mockup of the new website.

Mayor Todd stated there was a baseball tournament at the ball diamonds the previous weekend as well as next weekend. There were many families in town and all the money spent at the ball diamonds go back to the parks.

NEW BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated he and Scott Baltz talked about using different rock for chipping and oiling because the oil is bleeding through on some of the streets. Scott stated he talked to Bob Wolfmeier who looked into slag but the cost was double what is paid now. Mayor Todd and Scott discussed going back to using the half inch white chips. They may try to do some spot testing to see if it will work. The trap rock the Village has used for the last three years isn't available anymore due to the steel mill shutting down. Mayor Todd stated the retaining wall by the lift station in Alpine Meadows needs to be replaced. Scott Baltz has received two bids so far to replace the wall with blocks instead of timber.

ADJOURNMENT: Al Lehr made a motion to adjourn the general Village Board meeting and was seconded by Mike Capell. The motion carried unanimously.



Hellmann's Or Duke's?

Today on grocery shelves the main two choices of mayonnaise are Duke's and Hellmann's, but how did these two become the mainstay for salads and dips in our kitchens?

Food historians believe modern mayonnaise was created in 1756 in the port city of Mahon, in the Balearic Islands off the coast of Spain. At the start of the Seven Years' War, yes it really lasted seven years, between France and Britain, the French navy, led by the Duc de Richelieu, smashed Admiral Byng's poorly armed fleet at the Battle of Minorca. Byng was eventually executed for not trying hard enough! But I While preparing the fish course for Richelieu's victory dinner, his chef coped with the lack of cream on the island by substituting a goo of eggs mixed with oil and garlic.

The "unknown" chef took the recipe back to France, where it was improved by whisking the mixture, which created a creamier, soft mixture that could be used in any number of dishes. Mayonnaise became tartar sauce, remoulades, and the basis for a variety of salad dressings.

Whisking mayonnaise was one thing, but preserving the raw egg mixture which spoiled easily was another problem. This problem was solved in 1912 by Richard Hellmann, a German-American deli owner in New York. By using his own trucks and factories, Hellmann was able to manufacture and transport mayonnaise faster. Hellmann also designed the large mouth jar, encouraging large spoon full of the mayo on sandwiches and speeding up the emptying of the jar. What a great marketing tool.

Five years later, Eugenia Duke of North Carolina created Duke's mayonnaise, which is eggier and has no sugar. The two brands are still dueling it out


