Hello Spring! Just think Spring is right around the corner and begins on Monday, March 20th and Daylight savings time changes on Sunday, March 12th. We survived all Mother Nature threw at us this winter. Now we can look forward to our days getting longer and brighter and hopefully warmer weather will follow soon!

In 2017 we submitted an eighty-seven-page grant application to the Department of Aging. We were awarded the grant for two years and funds were used to subsidize the meals as they did the prior years. In 2019 we received a grant extension for two years and then in 2021 COVID was going on, so we were able to get another extension. Since the pandemic is officially over, we must rewrite and submit a new grant for the upcoming years. Of course, we will be requesting more funds than before to help with the rising costs of food and supplies. Seniors come to Senior Centers for many reasons. I think the most popular is to keep active because that keeps their mind sharp and body healthy. You come to depend on the social aspect and look forward to each day to see what is going on and there is always something different. We have several groups that meet weekly and other groups that have been formed among new friends. As we age we move to different stages of our lives and aging well means finding new things we enjoy, staying physically socially active and feeling connected to our communities and friends. The biggest enemy of boredom is social activity.

We welcome everyone to Millstadt Senior Services. If you live in the United States of America, your federal tax dollars subsidize Millstadt Senior Center. Last year we had 804 seniors use our programs. We served 47,160 meals total. There were 403 seniors from Millstadt (50%), 141 from Smithton (18%), 96 from Freeburg (12%) and remaining from Waterloo, Columbia, New Athens, Dupo, and East Carondelet.

AARP Tax-Aide Program

Free tax preparation services will be offered again this year on Wednesdays and Fridays from February 3rd through April 14th. This tax prep service is for average tax returns. If your return is more complex (e.g., depreciation, rental properties, etc.) it is advised that you seek the services of a paid tax professional.

Be sure to bring a copy of last years tax return along with: Photo ID

Any tax documents such as W-2's, 1099's, Social Security tax document (SSA-1099), interest statements, brokerage statements, property tax bills

The Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze

You most likely received your PTAX 340 in the mail this week. This exemption freezes the assessed value of your home. Applicant must be 65 or older and have a total household income of \$65,000 or less and must be the owner of record and use the property as their principal residence. This must be renewed ANNUALLY. We can fill it out for you, but we will need your 2022 Income Tax information or if you are not required to file income taxes, we will need your 2022 Income information. 





Benefit Access

What you will need to bring when filing for benefit access:

You will need to bring your Social Security 1099, completed income tax forms and W2 forms (if you are filing prior to tax day, April 15, you will need last year's 1099 and taxes and as such after tax day, April 15, you will need your current year 1099 and taxes), as well as your spouse's information. If you do not file taxes, you will need to sign a paper when you have your application submitted.

Benefit Access requirements:

1. Age

- you must be 65 years of age or older by December 31 of the current year; or
- you must be 16 years of age or older and totally disabled before January 1 of this year.

NOTE: "Person with a disability" means a person unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity by reason of a medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.

2. Residency

- you must live in Illinois at the time you file your application.

 3. Income Limit Eligibility for the License Plate discount and/or Ride Free Transit Card: (Income limit increase effective 1/1/2020.)

Your total income last year must be less than

- \$33,562 for a 1 person household (yourself only); or
- \$44,533 for a 2 person household (yourself and your spouse, or yourself and one Qualified Additional Resident); or
- \$55,500 for a 3 person household (yourself, your spouse and one Qualified Additional Resident, or yourself and two Qualified Additional Residents).

NOTE: You must include your spouse's income if married and living together on December 31 of last year. If your spouse died last year, you would file as single and claim only your income. Do NOT include the income of a Qualified Additional Resident.

Eligibility is good for two years under the Benefit Access Program. The twoyear period starts the date your application is approved. You may file again beginning 90 days before your eligibility expires.

Who qualifies as disabled?

To qualify as disabled, you must be at least 16 years of age prior to January 1 of the current year and be determined totally and permanently disabled from one of the following:

- Social Security Administration (Get Your Social Security Benefit Verification Online with mySocialsecurity), or
- Veterans Administration, or
- · Civil Service, or
- Railroad Retirement,

or have one of the following:

- a Class 2 disability card from the Illinois Secretary of State's office, or
- a completed Physician's Statement that meets the total disability criteria established by the Social Security Administration.

Who is a Qualified Additional Resident?

A Qualified Additional Resident is an individual, other than your spouse,

- who lived with you in the same residence last year and this year up to the time you file your Benefit Access Application; and
- for whom you, or you and your spouse, provided more than half of that person's total financial support last year; and
- who is not or should not be filing a separate Benefit Access Application. Qualified Additional Residents are not eligible for benefits.

What if I am NOT a U.S. citizen?

You do not have to be a U.S. citizen to qualify for a license plate discount or ride free transit card. However, you must have a Social Security number to fill out a Benefit Access Application. In the case of a married couple both individuals must have their own Social Security number. Qualified Additional Residents must also have their own Social Security number.

What if I am married?

- If you are married and you and your spouse lived together on December 31 of last year, you must complete one Benefit Access Application and report your total combined income. Your spouse cannot apply separately.
- If one or both of you resided in a nursing home, you should each complete a separate Benefit Access Application.
- If you and your spouse were permanently separated on December 31 of last year and are living at different addresses, you may each complete a separate Benefit Access Application, but may be required to prove that you are not living together by sending us legal separation papers from the court, divorce papers or a US1040 for each, indicating separate addresses.
- If you are a surviving spouse as of December 31 of last year, then you should file as single using only your income from last year.

New Medicare Enrollees Info

You have a 7-month window to sign up for Medicare.

- •3 months prior to your 65th birthday
- The month of your 65th birthday
- •3 months after your 65th birthday

If you are already collecting Social Security, you will automatically be signed up to start Medicare on the month of your 65th birthday. If you are not collecting Social Security, you will need to create a sign

on and password with Social Security.

If you have already created your Social Security account, you will need to bring your sign on and password to your appointment. For more information, please contact the Millstadt Senior Center at 618/476-3731.

How To Get Help From Social Security

Although we encourage using our online services, if your clients can't complete their business online, they can call us toll-free at 1-800-772-1213. Our phone lines are usually less busy before 10 a.m. and from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. local time, and later in the week, or later in the month. While appointments are strongly recommended, we continue to help people without one. An appointment reduces the wait time and ensures that your client knows what documents to bring, so we can help them in one visit. If your client needs to visit their local Social Security office without an appointment, we are here to help. Our offices tend to be less busy later in the day, later in the week, and later in the

Senior Health Insurance Program New (S.H.I.P)

During the summer months, Medicare beneficiaries may find it beneficial to start preparing in advance for Medicare's annual enrollment period which begins October 15th and ends December 7th. In the fall, your drug plan or health plan will mail to you an Annual Notice of Change letter or "ANOC," which will outline all the changes that will be made to your plan beginning January 1st. Before you receive these letters, we recommend scheduling an appointment with your primary care physician to review any medications that you are taking. This is especially useful if you have medications prescribed by more than one doctor. You may want to discuss the effectiveness of the medications, the strength and dosage, and what alternatives are available. Having this conversation with your doctor at least annually will prevent you from taking medications that are no longer needed or no longer effective. You may also find it beneficial to talk to your pharmacist. This may also help you save money! How Do You Get A New **Medicare Card?**

VILLAGE OF MILLSTADT

JANUARY 9, 2023 - NEW BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated that he was told that the water rates from Illinois American would be increasing at the beginning of the year by 30% to 40%. Tracy Holmes stated the office received a letter from them. Lori Touchette was going to look more into it, but it seemed like the wholesale rate, the lowest rate, went up 40%. The upper echelon rates went up even more. Mayor Todd stated that according to the Village ordinances the customers will incur the new cost. The citizens will probably be contacting the office to find out why their water bills are higher. Mike French asked if the Village had any recourse to this raise. Mayor Todd stated that years ago it was looked into getting water from the Smithton co-op, but water mains and a new tower would have to be built on Schmidt Lane. Randy Burk asked if Dupo also used Illinois American. Mayor Todd answered he thinks that they do. He asked the trustees to let the citizens know why the rates were raised to save on the phone calls to the office.

JANUARY 23, 2023 -

COMMITTEE ON ACCOUNTS: Mike Capell stated he reviewed the bills. Mike Capell made a motion to pay the bills. Mike French seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. PUBLIC WORKS: SEWER: Dustin Trankle stated a motor housing at the sewer plant needs to be replaced. WATER: Dustin Trankle stated there was a small water leak on M&O Station Road that was fixed on Friday, January 20th. STREETS, ALLEYS, AND SIDEWALKS: Scott Baltz stated there is an issue with the proposed sidewalk project on Parkview Drive. EastWest Gateway has rezoned Millstadt as rural, so the road work is no longer eligible for the grant. Village Engineer James Barganier clarified that they will accept the sidewalk project but nothing for the road. Mayor Todd asked how far along Parkview were they planning to do the project. Scott answered from North Jefferson Street to North Polk Street. The plan was to add sidewalk and resurface the street. James added this new zoning will apply to all street projects if EastWest Gateway is involved. Mayor Todd asked Scott to discuss it with Randy Burk. Mayor Todd stated he and Randy will be discussing which IGDB grants to apply for this year. Applications are due in March. PUBLIC BUILDINGS, MAINTENANCE, AND EQUIPMENT: Scott Baltz stated he ordered the truck that was included in the budget from Morrow Brothers Ford. PARKS, POOL, AND RECREATION: Mark Todd stated a bid was submitted by J.F. Electric for lighting on diamond 2 and diamond 3. They bid \$258,830 but \$6,000 would be deducted for grass work that can be taken care of by maintenance. Mark Todd made a motion to accept the bid for lighting on ball diamonds 2 and 3 by J.F. Electric for \$252,830. Dustin Trankle seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. Mayor Todd asked when the project would start. Scott Baltz answered that he told them he would discuss that with them on Tuesday, pending the approval. Mark Todd stated the Commercial Club Wing Fling will be held on Saturday, February 4th at St. James Parish Center. Doors open at 5pm. Proceeds go to the parks. CEMETERY: Ray Famula stated all of the single plots have sold out. He and Scott Baltz designated new plots for singles. There should not be an issue for another ten years. COMMUNITY CENTER: Ray Famula stated Dave Hankammer from the Township Board was appointed to the Senior Center Executive Board. The telephone reassurance program received a \$10,000 grant. The checking





account balance is \$59,705. The savings account balance is \$87,234. The grant base contract for 2022 - 2023 is \$226,980 but there are some questions that are being looked into due to the first quarter deposit. The AARP Income Tax Prep begins Monday, February 6th, by appointment only. Mike Capell is still offering his tech services on the fourth Fridays of the month. Volunteer drivers are needed for rural areas. The SMB Foundation is still donating the money to supply the containers for in-home meals. Their annual dinner is Saturday, February 11th and the cost is \$40. The elevator passed inspection and the license is displayed. PLANNING COMMISSION & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: Mike French stated the next Planning Commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 21st. BUILDING COMMISSIONER: Adam Romero stated there would be a Zoning Board meeting tomorrow, Tuesday, January 24th. OLD BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated the Village received the \$100,000 funds that were earmarked funds for the Village from Senator Christopher Belt for infrastructure projects. These funds will go towards the sewer lining project in Coachlite. Mayor Todd stated that at the previous meeting it was discussed that Illinois American will be raising their rates 40%. The office staff and Randy Burk figured out that the minimum usage payment will not see a significant increase but those using more than 1,000 gallons will see 7.6% increase. A few cities and villages have written the ICC about increasing the rates by 40% at one time. However Illinois American wouldn't have been able to increase without the ICC's approval. Mayor Todd stated the Village will be renewing the weed control services of Dandy Lawns for Tuffy Mueth Field for the upcoming year. NEW BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated the annual Fire Department meeting will be held on Friday, February 3rd at 6:30pm at the Columbus Club. Mayor Todd stated Sidebarr Technologies has been setting up the Village computers. The Police Department is having theirs done on Wednesday. It is a cyber security requirement by the insurance company. TREASURER'S REPORT: Tracy Holmes stated that the Treasurer's Report had been submitted. Ray Famula made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. CLERK'S REPORT: Tracy Holmes stated that the Clerk's Report had been submitted. Ray Famula made a motion to approve the Clerk's Report. Mike Capell seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

To pre-arrange or not to pre-arrange, that is ongoing dilemma of people all across our society. Pre-arranging funerals is fraught with many anxiety producing thoughts such as the cost, the decisions, the uncomfortableness of all of it. What is inevitable for every one of us seems dire to plan out in good times of health, prosperity and feeling as if it is years and years away.

I've been a funeral director since 2016 and believe me, I get it. Nobody wants to

think about death unless they have to, myself included.

I owned my funeral home here in Millstadt for three years before Frank and I sat down and made our pre-arrangements, so if you've been thinking about it for a while and haven't done it yet, don't feel bad. I've had the paperwork in front of me every day and still took that long to act. Frank wants traditional viewing with burial, I want to be cremated. Frank and I also have enough life insurance on each other to retire immediately if one of us dies. This was deliberate because of our small families and not having a whole lot of familial support to draw on should the unthinkable happen. Why am I telling you all of this?

First, everyone should pre-arrange their funeral for the simple fact that it gives you peace of mind knowing your wishes will be carried out and it saves your families the stress of having to make major decisions during a very difficult time of grief and uncertainty. That's the basic reason to pre-arrange, but notice I have been saying pre-arrange all this time and not pre-fund. There is a major difference between the two and every consumer should be aware of this.

Pre-arranged funerals mean that the consumer has made an appointment with the funeral director to record their wishes for their funeral services. Maybe they chose their merchandise and selected music and noted their desire for a funeral meal afterward. Maybe they signed their paperwork and chose simple cremation or maybe they gave the funeral director a copy of their life insurance policy for assignment at the time of death and a copy of their cemetery plot deed. The consumer did not pay the funeral home in advance. In this case, they are going to use life insurance proceeds or their own private funds to cover their final expenses. This is called a pre-arrangement, no money changed hands. This is a good option for those who do not wish to pay upfront or want to use life insurance or their own money at the time of death.

Pre-funded funeral arrangements are a second option and a bit more involved. Why do people pre-fund funeral arrangements? There are many reasons, the most common being that consumers have the funds available and want to finalize their funeral arrangements to save their families the stress of organizing a funeral and paying for it when the death occurs. Consumers have the option to pay all at once or to pay small monthly payments toward the balance over many years. The major benefit to a pre-funded funeral arrangement is that the current cost of the funeral is locked in and cannot be raised, by law, when the funeral home raises its prices. For example, a direct cremation that costs \$1,300.00 today will probably cost much more than that 20 years from now, but the consumer who pre-funded their direct cremation today will lock in that price and their family will not owe the difference when the consumer dies 20 years later. How is this possible? The money that is paid today, by law must be placed in either a guaranteed acceptance whole life insurance policy or trust fund account, and will draw a small amount of interest each year in order to offset inflation. This interest money is retained by the funeral home so that in 20 years when the direct cremation takes place, the funeral home is not losing money providing the service. This gets confusing for many consumers. Clients have asked me: "Why don't I just keep that invested and draw the interest myself?" or "I feel better having control over that money, rather than an insurance company or trust ' Both of these are valid points and I always suggest that clients do what is right for them. There are other financial concerns relating to Medicaid spend down that are too complex for this writing, but will be explained fully in person. In the end though, whatever decision a client makes, I always suggest that they at least pre-arrange their funeral plans so that the difficult decisions aren't left to grieving family members to make.

My clients are often pleasantly surprised that the pre-arrangement appointment is not stressful, nor unpleasant and can be done in their home if they prefer. I strive to make all pre-arrangement appointments relaxed, non-stressful, absolutely no pressure and fully transparent. There is no BS at my funeral home. One thing that has been very beneficial to me as a business owner has been my direct honesty. I offer, but do not "sell" anything, that difference is key. I allow the client to express to me what they desire, answer any questions, and let them make the decisions without undue influence from me. Here is a real-life example of that: Client chooses a piece of merchandise that costs \$6,000.00. I can supply that, but before I place that on the funeral contract, I will politely ask the client, "Are you sure that the decision to purchase this \$6,000.00 piece of merchandise instead of the other piece of merchandise that is also of high quality and costs \$1,800.00 is a decision that you will still be comfortable with 6 months from now?" Nine times out of ten, the client is pleased that I brought them around to clearer reasoning and they choose the more reasonably priced merchandise. This is foundational to our business model. When we say we are in funeral services for the right reasons, this is exactly what we mean.



BIBLE TALK

"POMP AND CIRCUMSTANCE"

Hello to all! Today we are picking up where we left off in February. Felix the governor was not unkind to Paul, but Paul was a constant reminder of God's high moral demands of which Felix was afraid. There was an argument between Jews and Greeks as to whether Caesarea was a Jewish or Greek city which escalated into a mob war. The Jews came off best until Felix sent troops to aid the Gentiles. Thousands of Jews were killed and houses of the wealthiest Jews were plundered. Rome was informed and Felix was recalled. Only the influence of his brother Pallas saved him from execution. Even though Felix was well aware that Paul should be liberated; in an attempt to redeem himself to the Jews, Felix left Paul imprisoned.

Acts 25:1-12. Three days after arriving in Caesarea, the new governor goes to Jerusalem to learn the charges against Paul. The Jewish leaders "urgently requested to have Paul transferred to Jerusalem "as a favor to them." "They were preparing an ambush to kill him along the way". Did Festus feel Paul was best left in the secure surroundings where he was? We don't know. We know very little about Festus, but what we do know proves he was a just and upright man. He died after only two years in office.

After eight to ten days, Felix returned to Caesarea to convene the court. Paul was brought before him to hear the charges of his accusers. Felix then asks Paul if he was willing to go to Jerusalem for his trial. Paul answers: "I appeal to Caesar". (Paul appeals to Caesar because he knows of the plot against his life). Festus declares: "To Caesar you will go". (vs 12).

Acts 25:13-22. "A few days later King Agrippa and Bernice arrived at Caesarea to pay their respects to Festus." (vs 13). Festus gives an account of Paul's case to the king. When Festus finishes, the king responds: "I would like to hear this man myself."

Acts 25:23-27). "The next day King Agrippa and Bernice came with great "POMP" into the room with the high ranking officers and leading men of the city". (Vs 23). At the command of Festus, the little Jewish tent maker with his hands in chains was brought in. Festus speaks to the group: "King Agrippa, and all who are present with us, you see this man! The whole Jewish community wants him dead. I have found he has done nothing deserving of death......I have decided to send him to Rome". (Vs 25).

In order for Festus to do so, an account of the case and the charges against Paul were to be sent with him. "I have brought him before all of you and especially before you, King Agrippa, so that as a result of this investigation I may have something to write".

Paul will speak to his "CIRCUMSTANCE" in chapter 26. Until next time, Spring has sprung. Enjoy it! Thank you for sharing your time with me. **Blessings, Pat Morris**

Moon Talk

On Monday March 6 and Tuesday March 7, feast your eyes on the final full moon of the winter season, the Worm

Moon. Common sense would suggest that this month's full moon gets its name from the sudden appearance of earthworms as they emerge from the soil as the ground temperature begins to slowly warm. Robins are singing and busy hunting for food and the earthworms are there to nourish them. But, it's not that straightforward. In the 1760's, Captain Jonathan Carver visited several Native American tribes who described beetle larvae emerging from the bark of trees during the month of March. Captain Carver then declared the March full moon the Worm Moon, but it would be given many other, and arguably more pleasant names as time went on.

Some of the names of the March full moon come from bird species activity during the month: the Eagle Moon, Goose Moon and Crow Comes Back Moon refer to the reappearance of these birds after the cold winter months.

The trees also give us a name for the March full moon: The Sugar Moondenoting the time of year that the sap of sugar maples begins to flow. We have all heard the phrase: March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb, the Wind Strong Moon, as described by the Pueblo people refers to the March winds. The Dakota, Lakota and Assiniboine Native American Tribes were even more descriptive with their name for the March full moon and called it the Sore Eyes Moon due to the blinding sunlight reflecting off of the snowfall of late winter.

Christianity also has two possible names for the March full moon, and like my favorite moon, the Harvest Moon, its name is dependent on when it rises in the month. If the March full moon rises before the spring equinox, it is called the Lenten Moon, if it rises after the spring equinox and therefore is the first full moon of spring, it is called the Paschal Moon.

This year, the full moon of March will reach peak illumination at 6:42am CT on Tuesday March 7, 2023 and will therefore be the last full moon of winter and will be the Lenten Moon.

For those of you who enjoy watching the moon, as I do, make plans to watch the last full moon of winter spectacularly rise on Monday evening, March 6, 2023, it will be very large near the horizon, very bright and beautiful. I hope you enjoy it! What name do you prefer to call the March full moon? My favorite name for this month's moon is the Sugar Moon.
