Marlou Eckert from Millstadt Township. The Illinois Township Volunteer of the Year award honors an individual who goes above and beyond the call of volunteerism to the State of Illinois Township Senior Centers, and its presentation is one of the highlights of the annual Illinois Township Convention Awards event.

Marlou retired eleven years ago from the Internal Revenue Service in Springfield, Illinois and returned to her hometown of Millstadt, Illinois. In 2010 the Millstadt Senior Center had a new director and was looking for someone to help with the monthly newsletter. Marlou stopped by and has been helping since by writing and contributing local senior news.

By helping to promote the newsletter, Marlou helped show what activities were going on at the center as well in the community. Many are anxious to read Senior Talk to see what their parents have been doing during the month. Whether winning at a bags tourney or going on a field trip, Marlou has helped provide the 411 (information). The Senior Talk newsletter has become essential reading not only for seniors, but the entire community.

MILLSTADT RECEIVES "CHAMPION OF YOUTH" AWARD

Millstadt was honored at the Illinois Municipal League Conference on September 25, 2021 by the Illinois Sister Cities Association with the "Champion of Youth" award for Millstadt Sister Cities' outstanding Youth Ambassador Exchange program.

The award reflects the adventurous and generous spirit of Millstadt youth and families to participate in international travel and host a German student on a reciprocal visit. This award is also a testament to the work and dedication of Sister Cities members and the strong support of the Millstadt community. With the cooperation and efforts of the Gross-Bieberau *Verschwisterungskomitee*, all exchange participants enjoy safe, memorable experiences.

Many current residents of Millstadt can trace their ancestry to Gross-Bieberau, a small town in the State of Hessen, southeast of Frankfurt. A sister city partnership was formalized in 2000.

Annual Youth Ambassadors Exchanges began in 2001 wherein up to five Millstadt-area high school students travel to Gross-Bieberau and spend 4 weeks in host families with students of similar age. In turn, the German students arrive in late July for a month-long visit with their Millstadt exchange partners. As a result of the generous support of local residents, businesses, and civic organizations a total of 86 Millstadt students and 89 German students have participated so far in this Youth Ambassadors Exchange, and lasting friendships have developed between the Millstadt and German youth and their families.

Unfortunately, exchange visits were canceled in 2020 and 2021 as a result of the world-wide coronavirus pandemic; but, both Millstadt and Gross-Bieberau are optimistic about resuming exchanges in 2022. Interested Millstadt students and families are encouraged to visit https://

As one of the founding members, Marlou was instrumental in the organization and development of the Sandra M Bereitschaft Foundation a 501(c)3 organization. Sandra Bereitschaft was a dedicated volunteer that passed away and Marlou took on the challenge to get this non-profit affiliation application approved and to carry on the work of Sandy Bereitschaft. She serves on the board of directors and until recently had been their treasurer.

Her contribution to the Senior Center has been She has always been eager to sponsor "special" days for seniors. Some of these have included her special Egg Sausage Strata Day, Tea and Crumpet Day, Veteran Day events and many others. She has chaired the "Big Ole Bag and Jewelry Sale" for the Meals on Wheels program in our area, in the past nine years this event has profited \$17,768. Marlou also helps at the Annual BBQ Fundraiser for the Senior Center by organizing and recruiting volunteers. She has the magnetism that draws people to want to help and make our community better for seniors. She delivers Meals on Wheels every Monday and Friday and has continued to do so during the pandemic. 

Millstadt Senior Center has not increased the cost of meals since 2013 as food costs continue to rise.



2022 SOCIAL SECURITY CHANGES

Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA):

Based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI-W) from the third quarter of 2020 through the third quarter of 2021, Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) beneficiaries will receive a 5.9 percent COLA for 2022. Other important 2022 Social Security information is as follows:

NOTE: The 7.65% tax rate is the combined rate for Social Security and Medicare. The Social Security portion (OASDI) is 6.20% on earnings up to the applicable taxable maximum amount (see below). Also, as of January 2013, individuals with earned income of more than \$200,000 (\$250,000 for married couples filing jointly) pay an additional 0.9 percent in Medicare taxes. BIBLE TALK

GIVE THANKS

Hello to all and welcome to our study.

Acts 11 continues St Luke's narrative of chapter ten regarding clean > and unclean. Peter as a young boy was most certainly taught at temple: "In the beginning, God created the heavens and earth....and everything in it". (Genesis 1-31).

Acts 11:1-18 Explains Peters explanation of why he went to the home and ate a meal with unclean men. Something forbidden by Jewish law. When Peter explains his vision and hearing the voice from heaven saying: "Do not call anything impure that God has made clean". When they heard this, they had no further objections and praised God.

When St. Stephen was martyred (Acts 7: 54-60), the believers were scattered; and although fearful, they continued to share their message; but only to the Jews. Other believers, however, went to Syrian Antioch to share the Good News with the Greeks (Gentiles). Barnabas was sent to Antioch and during his time there a great many people were brought to the Lord. Barnabas realized he needed help and sought out his friend Saul/Paul. For a whole year, they taught great numbers of people.

NOTE: Pre Resurrection, Jesus tells his disciples: "I was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel". The Jews. (Matthew 15:21-26). Post Resurrection, Jesus' final words to his disciples: "Preach the good news to all creation". (Mark 16:14-20). The disciples were first called Christians at Antioch. (Acts11:26). The word Christian is found two other times in the Bible; Acts 26:28 and 1st Peter 4:16.

Acts 11:27-30 tells of great sacrifice. The prophet, Agabus, predicts a great famine will fall over the entire Roman world. Although they had no idea of the duration of this great famine, the Gentile believers in Antioch were willing to share what they had with their Jewish believers. A good reminder that the basis of God's New Covenant with his people is LOVE. Love the Lord your God and love your neighbor. (Matthew 22:36-40).

We are in the month for giving thanks and I am reminded of the words of St. Paul: "Be joyful always, pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is Gods's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1st Thessalonians 5:16-18). Thank you for allowing me to share God's word with you today.

When A Muffin Tin Isn't Just A Muffin Tin

Muffin tins can be used for more baking options than the standard muffin recipes. Now with the weather getting colder think ahead and turn that oven to 350 degrees and think mini meat loafs, potato gratin for one, or mini pizzas.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees, cooking time will vary, check after 25 minutes of baking, bake until crusts are brown or check meatloaf with meat thermometer for doneness. Spray tins with cooking spray or use cupcake paper liners to prevent sticking. The best part of these mini portions is they can be frozen, unthawed and eaten later.

Mini Pizzas; Press store bought dough into the cups; fill with shredded cheese, sauce and your choice of vegetable or meat toppings. Bake until the crust is brown and cheese is melted.

Taco-salad cups; cut flour tortillas into small circles, press them into the cups, and bake until lightly browned. Fill baked shells with crumbled protein, cheese, tomatoes or your choice of taco toppings. Vary the toppings to have a variety of mini salad cups.

Potato gratin; Toss thinly sliced potatoes with cheese and your choice of seasonings. Layer the mixture into the cups and bake until the potatoes are soft and lightly browned.


Cash In Your Change

Our library staff and District Board are extremely excited about the potential for a new library – and are hoping our local community shares that enthusiasm.

After a thoughtful and deliberate planning and design stage by the District Board and Building Committee, the library is currently budgeted at \$4.1 million. This building would host two community-accessible meeting rooms, six study spaces and ample room and seating areas. With the new location next to the Millstadt Primary Center, it will also be able to help Millstadt's wonderful local schools and students reach their educational goals.

SEWER: Dustin Trankle stated the new equipment for the sewer plant upgrade has been delivered. Scott Baltz stated the storm sewer in Parkview will be lined this week. REFUSE: Dustin Trankle stated the leaf dumpsters will be available on Friday, October 22nd at the maintenance shed. They are for leaf and yard waste only. STREETS, ALLEYS AND SIDEWALKS: Randy Burk stated he has heard compliments about the streetscape project. Scott Baltz added that they should be finishing the south side of the road within the next week and will be moving to the north side. COMMUNITY CENTER: Ray Famula stated the Senior Center fiscal year ended September 30th. The Center served 34,469 meals which is the most meals served in the history of the Senior Center. They will again be putting together a wall to honor the local Veterans for Veterans Day. AgeSmart is offering them funding to include New Athens in their service area. There is a Halloween Party scheduled for October 29th. They are currently taking applications for LIHEAP. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 19th at 6pm. PLANNING COMMISSION & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: Mike French stated the next Planning Commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 19th . Mayor Todd stated the trustees received information on dividing up the property at the end of Josiah Lane that was recently annexed into the Village. The properties will be going to adjoining property owners including one business. Randy Burk made a motion to approve the division of the parcel at the end of Josiah Lane. Mike French seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously. OLD BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated Scott Baltz received the report for the EPA testing at the shed. Scott stated he did not see any issues in the report he has looked at but he still needs to review it. Scott Baltz stated he talked with a striper who will be putting yellow lines down on the tennis court for pickleball. It should be done by the end of the month. Mike French stated he will have information on the new entrance signs at the next Village Board meeting. Ray Famula added he had talked with Otto Faulbaum about possibly incorporating the Sister Cities in the new sign. Mike stated he had talked to Otto about possibly adding additional signage since the design was already completed on the new signs. NEW BUSINESS: Mayor Todd stated the Village will be applying for a DCEO grant in January to extend the streetscape on Washington Street. If the Village is awarded the grant, it would extend the streetscape one block to the east and one block to the west. If the Village is not awarded that grant then a different grant will be applied for from ITEP, but that grant would only allow extension to the west. Chief Hucke stated it comes down to what is considered reasonable. Resident Kasey Hay asked how to get written permission to use certain weapons. Mayor Todd stated there will be a form in the Village Office that can be filled out.






